Approve severance

A house at 120 Mill Street and a store and apartments at 122 Mill Street, Acton, will be on separate pieces of land, as they were originally, thanks to a Halton Land Division Committee decision.

The owner of both pieces of property Janko Delisimunovic sought the severance to obtain a mortgage.

His agent, Fred Cunningham, explained the lands were separated into three lots in 1921, but in 1971 the two lots had "inadvertently" been put in one name. He said his client wants to retain the right of way along the back of the store, which has been used for many years.

A condition, sought by the Town of Halton Hills, that parking spaces be provided for the tenants, was ignored by the Land Division Committee since, they felt nothing will be changed by the severance.

Cunningham pointed out the condition is impossible to meet, since there is "just no more land than there was before". He termed a suggestion by the Town that a covenant be put on title for the parking spaces, as "probably illegal."

Committee member Ab Ackerman said it was simply a technical severance for mortgage purposes, and should have no conditions attached.

Quit claim on right-of-way

A 1.1 acre narrow strip of land by Acton High School, owned by Halton Board of Education, will be severed to allow a quit claim deed.

The right-of-way existed on the property when the board of education bought it in 1975, but never used it, solicitor for the board, Robert Statton, told Halton Land Division Committee.

The strip of land running south to Highway 7, will now be sold to Rinarin Ltd. who are the abutting landowners. No development is planned at this time, but Rinarin has filed a conceptual plan for lands south of Acton High School.

The lawyer explained the right-of-way is registered on title and the board now wants to clear it up.

The committee approved the technical severance.
