Ontario's Wetlands

Most people have found fault with Ontario's wellands; they have been called stink holes and various other names including breeding areas for unwanted bugs. But then there are two sides to every problem and that's probably what prompted the Ontario Government to introduce wetland management guidelines for Ontario.

These guidelines do not supersede or take priority over other provincial planning policies, and recognize that other matters, such as housing, forestry, agriculture, mining, watershed protection, tourism, recreation, environment and the concerns of native people, must also receive consideration in land-use planning.

Definition

For the purpose of these guidelines, wetlands are areas with shallow standing water, (less than 2 metres deep), until July 1 in most years. They are divided into four major categories: swamps, marshes, bogs and fens.

Background

Wetlands are important to Ontario's economy. They maintain and improve water quality, help control flooding, provide habitat for fish and wildlife, and

contribute substantial social and economic benefits. These include outdoor recreation and tourism benefits from such activities as hunting, fishing and bird-watching amounting to over 53 million user-days per year for 7 million resi-

Wetlands also contribute to the ecological diversity of the landscape and provide habitat for several threatened and endangered species. They provide protection against flooding by holding rainfall during peak periods and releasing it over the following months. They are a source of many important resource products, such as fur, wood and wild rice, valued in excess of \$300 million annually. The benefits they provide and the overall provincial interest in wetlands should be taken into account in any related planning action.

Notes

At one time, Ontario had almost 50-million hectares of wetland, of which over 2 million hectares were in southern Ontario.

Only 13 to 22 per cent of the original southern Ontario wetlands remain. Ontario has more than 10,000 individual wetlands. About 40 per cent are less than four hectares in size.

Wetland loss is caused by shoreline disturbance, land clearing, drainage, filling or impoundment.

The above article from the Ministry of Natural Resources is food for thought and leads us to believe that wetlands could be more valuable to us when (wet) than (dry).
