

Garage sales — for better or for worse


with only one spoke missing, or six paperback novels for a dollar.

So much for human nature. These were taxpayers who had helped buy the books their kids had stolen, and now wanted to sell them back to the system so that other kids could steal the books they were still paying taxes for.

May I digress for a moment? Kids do steal books. Regularly. They don't consider it 'stealing'. It's just taking something from a big institution. That's not stealing, according to about 50 per cent of them. It's just like Dad not declaring something on his income tax or Mom ordering a dress from Eaton's, wearing it to a party, then taking it back to the mail order office and returning it, claiming it was "too small" or had smudge marks in the armpits (after she'd discoed in it for four hours.)
