RECIPE OF THE WEEK CHOCOLATE ORANGE DROPS

½ cup margarine
¾ cup firmly packed brown sugar
1 egg
1 cup all purpose flour
1 cup soft whole wheat flour
1 tsp. baking soda
½ tsp. salt
1/8 tsp. ground cloves
grated rind of 1 orange
¼ cup orange juice
1 cup chocolate chips

Cream margarine and brown sugar; beat in egg. Combine all purpose flour, whole wheat flour, baking soda, salt and cloves. Blend thoroughly into creamed mixture. Add orange rind, orange juice and chocolate chips. Mix well. Drop from teaspoon onto greased cookie sheets. Bake at 375 degrees F about 10 to 12 minutes. Makes about 4 dozen.
