



When I visited a country store the other day, I was amused to see a great deal of laundry starch on a shelf. It made me think that I hadn't used laundry starch for years.

It brought to mind that years ago, I had to make starch for every wash for the cotton dress shirts my husband wore, the frilly dresses my little girls had, the aprons, the tablecloths, etc. Now I don't even bother when I wash daily!

Come to think of it, not many young people do much ironing any more. It doesn't seem to matter if things are wrinkled a bit. There are always much. more important things to do than ironing or starching!
