







All-stars converge on Acton for show down

Some of the best junior fastball players in Ontario will converge on Prospect Park, Acton, this Saturday evening to suit up for the annual Ontario Junior Fastball League all-star game.

The local Acton Junior A's will be hosting the event and will have six members of their defending Ontario Junior 'C' championship squad on the field ' as East battles West for bragging rights for another season.

Last year the East which includes Acton. Guelph, Waterloo, Maryhill and Cambridge came out on top of their classic against New Hamburg, New Dundee, Baden and Innerkip but that could change this season.

Two members of the Acton squad earned first team selections from the East division coaches with Glen 'Scooter' Scott earning the only unanimous selection at centre field. Scott, a Limehouse native, was selected to the first team for the second year in a row. The Acton team captain is currently tied for sixth in league batting with a .316 average and includes four home runs in his totals.

The other Acton player selected to the first team was shortstop Mark Symes. Symes was a pleasant surprise to the local squad this season moving over from baseball to fastball in quick fashion. The league leader in stolen bases, Symes is fifth in

league batting with a .327 average.

Tim Baker narrowly missed the nod as catcher on the first team by a single vote. Baker is tied with teammate Scott at .316 for league batting honors and has four homers of his own to complement a strong arm behind the plate. Baker has been with the Acton team since its inception four years ago.

Kent "Freddie" McArthur will be the back-up second baseman with the Eastern all-stars. McArthur is in his first year with the A's after playing his minor ball in Hillsburgh. The 16-year-old has been a surprise at the plate batting a respectable

with this year's all-star squad as a third pitcher. Because of injury, Spear was out of the line-up for three weeks with stretched knee ligaments and five weeks off the pitching rubber which coach Steve Marshall said hindered his chances at a first team selection. Spear led the Acton squad to the Ontario Junior 'C' title last season. earning the most valuable pitcher award along the way. This season Spear has the third best earned run average in the league at 2.33 and is seventh in league batting with a .305 total, including three


Battling Milton John's Mobile, the Acton Royal Trust Stingers stung their opponents twice to come away with a 2-2 tie.
