But I wasn't there. On D-Day, 1944, I was playing softball in Northumberland, a godforsaken, cold, wet (even in June) piece of England up near Scotland.

Oh, we'd heard the news on the radio, and we were excited and a bit disappointed that we weren't in on it. But the casualties hadn't started yet, and a bunch of us who had been training and training and training, on Spitfired, Hurricanes, then Typhoons, were formed into a makeshift squadron to repel a counter-attack from Norway, just in case.


There was no counter-attack. So we played softball. Somebody sprained his ankle. That was D-Day for me. A year later, half of us were dead.

I didn't write about the Liberal leadership campaign, because I don't like inhaling hot air unless it's good for me. But I did watch and hear the final speeches and the convention. Could have been there if I'd bothered to get a press pass. No thanks.

I've been to political conventions, and I've seen proud, ambitious men swallow their pride, ambition, and dignity scrambling for a few votes from delegates who don't represent the people, but The Party. It's a bit sickening.

John Munro, about as much like John Turner as I am like Pierre Trudeau, made the long walk to Chretlen. Then came John

Roberts, a handsome, eloquent cabinet minister. Hugs and kisses. The only thing missing was the ghost of Judy LaMarsh, whose famous, "We've gotta stop this bastard," did not endear her to Pierre Elliot T., at who it was almed when he donned the crown, about 15 years ago.


