CVCA studies stocked salmon
In April of this year, the Credit Valley Conservation Authority received funding for a salmonid stocking assessment project under the Canada Works Program (Unemployment Insurance Act—Section 38).

In cooperation with the Lake Ontario Fisheries Assessment Unit, this project's six (6) employees will be engaged in a survey of the lower Credit River to determine the survival rate, behaviour and habitat preference of stocked yearling.
In addition to this survey, a creel census is planned to coincide with the annual "Toronto Star Great Salmon Hunt" to determine the rate of return to spawning areas by the various age classes.
Participants in the Hunt will have the opportunity to occasionally have their trout and salmon gutted at the Port Credit docks by employees of this program; analysis of the stomach contents will provide information on the forage base of these large predatory fish.

Picnic tragedy is averted
A picnic on the Rattlesnake bluffs Friday evening turned into a near tragedy when a 28-year-old man fell 30 feet off a cliff edge.
Halton Regional Police said Ian King, of 8 Spencer Ave., was sharing a picnic with three other friends Friday evening when the accident occurred. He was walking along the edge and stepped onto a lower rock face when he lost his footing, said police, plunging 30 feet down onto boulders.
Milton firefighters aided by police and ambulance crew spent an exhaustive 45 minutes to rescue the victim.
Fire department official Roger Clement described it as one of the most difficult rescues.
"It was really tough because of all of the boulders, inclines and declines," he said, adding it was a "well co-ordinated" effort that was successful in removing Mr. King in less than an hour.
He was taken to Milton District Hospital where he is reported to be improving and in good, stable condition.
Hospital officials declined to comment on the nature of his injuries but said they are continuing tests.

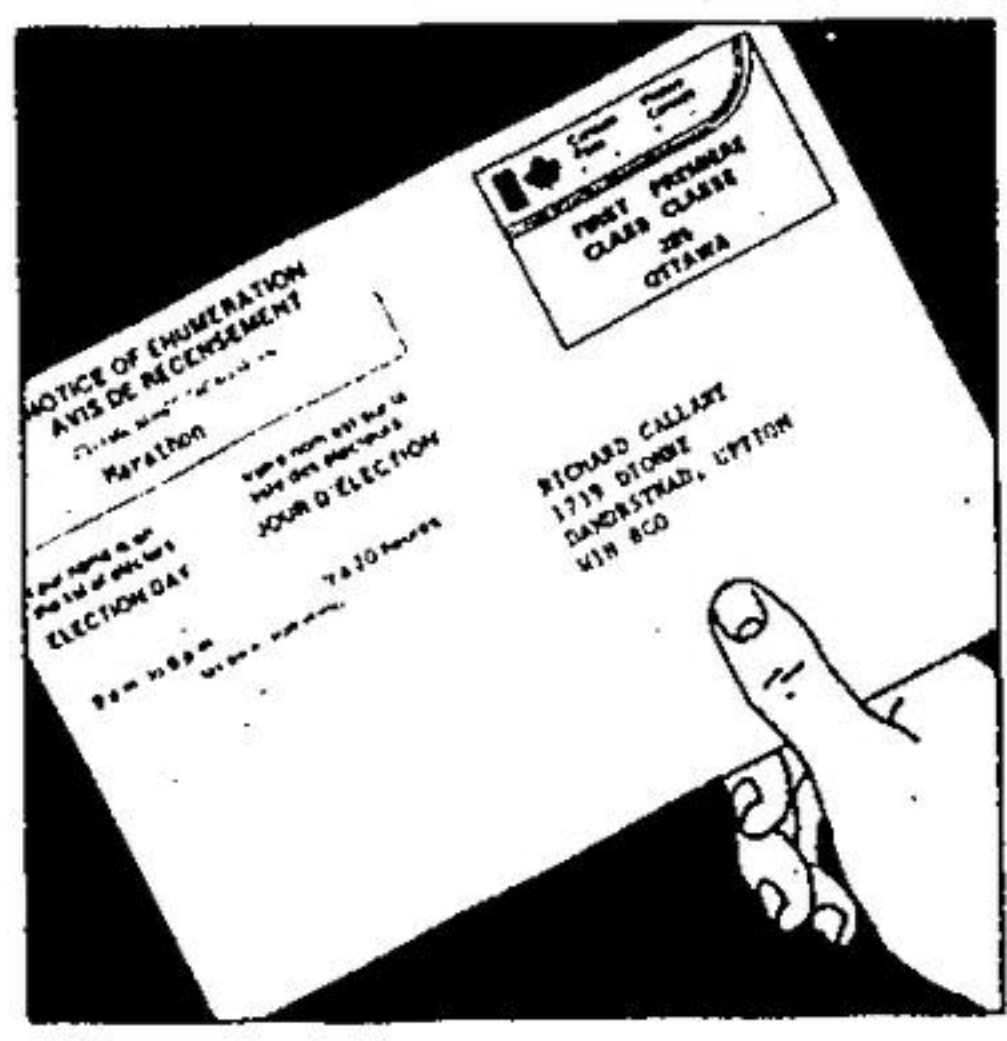

If there are any errors, please call the Elections Canada Office for your riding, listed here, and they'll tell you how to correct any mistakes.

IF YOU HAVE NOT RECEIVED YOUR CARD, HERE'S WHAT YOU SHOULD DO.
Call the Elections Canada Office for your riding and an official will tell you how you may get your name on the Voters' List. Act quickly - urban revision ends August 17.

Yes, if you are a Canadian citizen aged 18 years or over and have been a resident of your polling division since July 27.

RURAL AREAS AUGUST 15.
If you haven't received a NOTICE OF ENUMERATION card, and are a qualified voter, you can still vote on Election Day, provided you are "vouched for" on oath at your polling station, by a voter who knows you and who is on the list for that polling division.
VOUCHING IS ALLOWED ONLY IN RURAL AREAS ON ELECTION DAY.
Complete details on the Advance Polls and Election Day will be published in the coming weeks.
