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Demand up for NDP lawn signs

"Things are really going quite well," said Doug Black, Kevin Flynn's campaign manager. "We're very optimistic about the vote in Acton." "The Liberal vote seems to be collapsing." Flynn has been in Acton twice over the last week, knocking on doors and answering questions. Concerns of Acton citizens seem to be about interest rates, unemployment and job security. "We're getting a very favorable response," Black said. "The issues people ask us about are very similar to those that concern people in Milton and Oakville." Campaign workers as well as Flynn himself are getting a very good response, Black said. Flynn was in Acton again last night (Tuesday) and he will return Saturday to do some door-knocking and some campaigning downtown.

Greens candidate wants GO in Acton

Halton Green Party candidate Chris Kowalchuk will begin to post his campaign signs at the end of the week. Kowalchuk is making his own signs and he will be canvassing in the Acton area soon. Kowalchuk raised his concern over Acton's transit problem in a recent interview. "Why doesn't Acton have the Government of Ontario's service (GO)?" he asked. He also said he would consider approaching Ontario Premier Bill Davis to get GO train service in Acton. He raised his concerns after hearing of Progressive-Conservative MP Jelinek's resolve to reinstate VIA Rail service to the town and similar statements made by NDP candidate Kevin Flynn and Liberal candidate Oriana Currie.

NDP promise farmer better deal if elected

"Canada's fragile economic recovery, much talked about by government and in the pages of the business press, has left farmers out in the cold," says Sandy Young, NDP candidate for Wellington-Dufferin-Simcoe. "The national farm bankruptcy rate has increased again this year. In fact, it has quadrupled since 1979, and that's not because people are eating less food." Young says farmers are caught in a cost-price squeeze because of the enormous increase in their input costs, especially the cost of borrowing money to support their highly capital intensive business. More important, he says, farmers are increasingly unable to negotiate a fair share of the consumer food dollar against the monopoly pricing practices of the giant corporations with their ever greater control of the processing, distribution and retail industries. "Steen's Dairy in Erin, for instance, is one of the few remaining independent dairies, not only in this riding, but in all of Ontario." "That's because the so-called free enterprise system as practiced by the Liberals and Tories, has allowed competition to be all but eliminated from the dairy industry."

Liberals disorganized? Not really, Lalonde says

If Halton elects Oriana Currie to go to Ottawa retiring cabinet minister Marc Lalonde said he would gladly "make room for her." Mr. Lalonde was the guest speaker at a Liberal luncheon held last Thursday in the Howard Johnson Hotel in Oakville. Having spent five years as the minister responsible for the status of women, Mr. Lalonde said he was pleased his party has twice as many women seeking office in this election; and that amount is "twice as many as the Tories." Having met Mrs. Currie for the first time at lunch, Mr. Lalonde said he had found her "not only an exceptional woman, but a businesswoman as well." He urged the assembled 100 party faithful to do their best to get her elected to represent Halton. That finished, Mr. Lalonde launched into the things Liberals wanted to hear. He outlined four major areas in which the Liberal Party had been making promises which are realistic. Firstly he said there will be a much simplified tax system for small business so it can do its job without a lot of red tape and paper burden. Secondly, to encourage risk-taking by small and medium-sized business, Mr. Lalonde said Mr. Turner would allow 100 per cent of capital losses to be deducted against capital gains or other incomes which would be up for the 50 per cent allowed now. Thirdly, Mr. Turner has promised what Mr. Lalonde described as a "one-stop, store-front operation for small business." These store-front operations would be established by regrouping a number of federal departments under one wing. "A person could walk in off the street," Mr. Lalonde said, to find out about taxation, exemptions, federal programs, grants available, where to make bids, and regulations. Fourthly, he described the John Turner program of Young Entrepreneurs which would consist of federal grants up to \$10,000 to people between 17 and 31 years of age who want to get into the private sector. Community committees would decide on the viability of the grant request and the committee's approval of disapproval would be accepted at the federal level. Mr. Lalonde said the beauty of the four areas is they would not cost the taxpayer anything but would come from cutbacks, reallocations, and cost savings in other federal departments. "We all know there is no free lunch," he said referring to the estimate the Brian Mulroney program platform could cost \$20 billion.
