






Acton Oldtimers oust Sandstone for Industrial tournament title

When the smoke finally cleared from the Limehouse ball diamonds Monday night, the Acton Firestone Oldtimers were walking away with the Industrial League Tournament's top honors.

With upsets being the norm in the three day fastball extravaganza, it wasn't too unrealistic to see the favored winners dropping out of contention early in the tournament and the most unlikely squads coming up with brilliant plays to claim top finishing positions

The Oldtimers, with the pitching of Chris Peavoy, and the experience of Dan Arbic, were an awesome force to contend with throughout the three day event.
