Four local bowlers pinned down top finishing positions in the All Ontario Family TwoSome Tournament Sept. 1 at the Plantation Bowlerama, Islington.

Richard and Brad Cripps captured 13th spot in the Junior five pin division while the team of Crystal and Brenda Hillier claimed ninth overall in the Bantam five pin category.

The Cripps squad, with a handicap of 220, recorded a total of 1099 points in the four game series and the Hillier team tallied 1024 points with a handicap of 304.

Seeing Coffey thwart a two-on-one Russian attack that had Canadian fans closing their eyes in horror brought goose bumps to my arms and then watching the same Coffey race back down to the Soviet end zone and set up the play that would win the game had me waving my Canadian flag from the edge of my couch.

Tonelli digging in the corners and feeding the puck back to Coffey on the

point had the Russians running in circles and when Coffey's first line drive was deflected, Tonelli was right back in there feeding the puck back again.

That last shot is etched into my mind now. Coffey wound up, faked and then with a powerful wrist shot flicked the puck towards the top left corner of the Russian goal. With Bossy on the mark deflecting the puck past the Soviet goaltender, the opposition didn't have a chance.

At the risk of sounding melodramatic, that game is the epitome of what hockey is all about.

While it is rare to see minor hockey clubs displaying the same respective calibre of hockey, seeing a game like that will surely motivate many young hockey players into giving that little extra bit of effort that makes a winning team.
