Manor absenteeism

Johnson wants answers

A regional commission, much like a Royal Commission, is what Milton councillor Bill Johnson will call for today if he does not get "satisfactory answers on discrimination and intimidation" inside Halton Centennial Manor.

Mr. Johnson said he is not satisfied with the answers he received when he had questions on a regional report on the problem of absenteeism inside the Manor.

That report showed the sick days average to be far greater than any other regional department. One of the solutions to sick leave suggested in a report was asking Manor nurses to have a physical before being hired.

But since that report three weeks ago, Mr. Johnson said he has heard other disturbing reports which he feels must be cleared up. If that has to take place in a public forum, then so be it, he said.

"I am thinking about a commission, like a Royal Commission, where we would have witnesses who would testify," he said.

Mr. Johnson said he feels the "discrimination" is particularly evident among the Registered Nurses and Registered Nursing Assistants at the Manor.

"We've had 19 nurses leave the Manor in the past two years," he said. "That's more than have left the Joseph Brant Hospital, a hospital which is seven times bigger than the Manor."

Mr. Johnson said he thinks one reason so many nurses are leaving is because of work schedules which he feels must be examined.

"A nurse is required to work 11 consecutive nights."

"If she refuses to work a twelfth, she can be fired on the spot," Mr. Johnson said.

Mr. Johnson said one reason he has waited until today is to give regional chairman, Peter Pomeroy, a chance to conduct his own look into problems in the Manor which Mr. Johnson said he brought to the attention of Mr. Pomeroy.
