While this year's Run failed to reach its \$15,000 goal, organizers Jon Hurst and Paul Murr said they were delighted with the increased turn-out and total amount raised.

"We're just pleased it's up again from last year." Hurst told the Free Press. "The important thing is we've increased our total every year. Maybe that gives us a psychological edge for next year. We have every reason to be happy."

Citizen of the Year Dr. David van der Bent arrived at the high school track bright and early to join Miss Acton Fair Linda Thomson and Fall Fair princesses Lorraine Robinson and Laura Brillinger in officially opening the Run.

Other highlights included another strong showing by Acton High School student Donna Mitchell, who raised the most money among this year's participants. The 18-year-old signed up \$629 in pledges to almost double her total from 1983.

A team of eight Baltimore Aircoil employees made the trek to Acton to raise \$547, an amount they split between the Georgetown and Acton causes.

The oldest competitor in this year's Run was Bill Black, 83, who's taken part in all four Acton Terry Fox Runs, this year and last relying on son Keith to guide his progress in a wheelchair.

Youngest participant was probably little Shawn Knoepfli, who, at nine months of age, didn't likely understand why his mother Lorraine kept pushing his baby carriage around in circles.
