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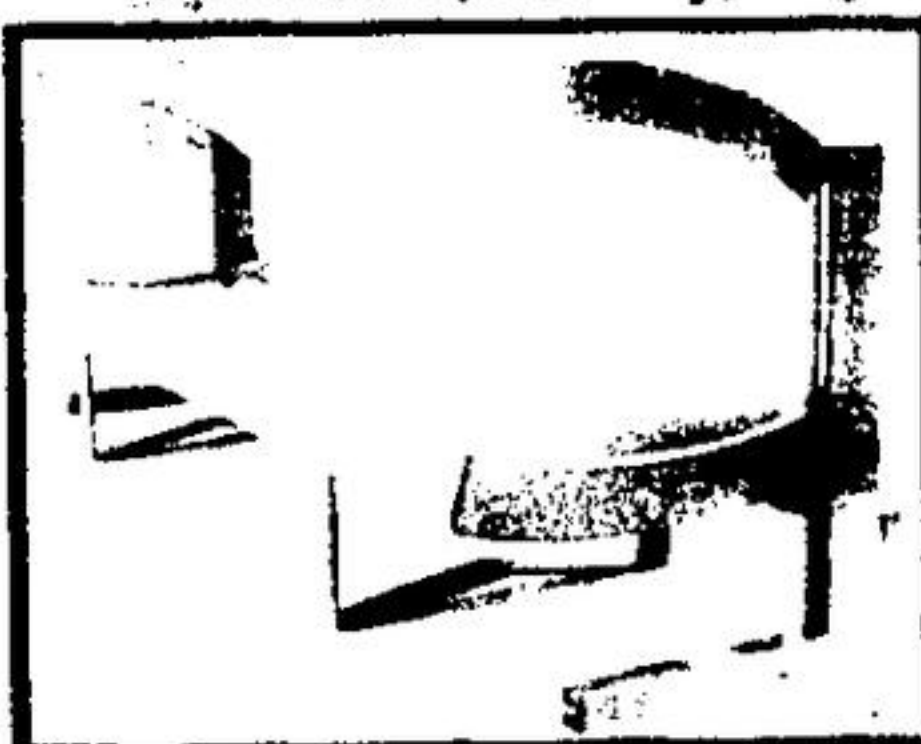

Limehouse mother of two selected best photographer in Fall Fair contest

A Limehouse mother of two was selected best photographer among the eleven area shutterbugs who entered the 1984 Acton Free Press Fall Fair Photo Contest.

Montreal native Terry Anthony, who farms with husband Frank in RR 1 Limehouse, studied photography at community college as well as film and television arts at Concordia University and still hopes to make a go of professional photography at some future time.

In the meantime, she's delighted to have both of the photos she submitted chosen as the best in two different categories. She also won top prize in the Fall Fair contest several years ago, the only other time she's entered.

Pro photographer Bill Stuckey, who judged this year's three dozen entries at his RR 2 Acton studio, picked Anthony's photos, "Rape Seed" and "The Character" almost immediately from the pile of photos before him.

With its glint of dawn sunlight casting a yellow glow over a farmer's field, "Rape Seed" was a prime choice as Best Overall. It was taken at 5.30 a.m. one morning with a Konica T3 camera and 100 ASA film.

Selected as "Best Family Photo", from a strong field of pictures of children and pets, "The Character" depicts Anthony's daughter Monica, then a year and a half old, clambering around in a large cardboard box with a baseball cap slung low over her eyes.

"I always wanted to be a children's photographer," Anthony told this newspaper. "Maybe when the kids are a little older, I can concentrate a bit more on it."

In the only other category, "Scenic Photos", Ted Hilton of RR 2 Acton caught Stuckey's eye with his colorful "A Different Kind of Flower" to take first place. A classic shot of tangled dandelions at close range is made all the more interesting by a mauve backdrop left effectively out of focus by correct use of lens.

Runners-up in the three categories should find consolation in the difficulty Stuckey had selecting one over another.

In the Overall section, Diane Evans of RR 1 Limehouse was judged second best for her delicate close-up of a rosebud in bloom, the morning dew still intact and very clear thanks to sharp focus. Third place went to John Feenstra of Guelph, who followed up on a great idea in posing baby Andrea atop a box of Pampers diapers, a price list in her hand.

In the Family Photos category, second place went to Cathy McDonald of RR 4 Rockwood, who took a picture of a young Halloween celebrant after making rounds. He peers over a tabletop covered in trick-or-treat goodies.

Under Best Scenic, Yvonne Thorn of

RR 1 Guelph took second place for her winter scene showing late afternoon sun on a hillside with a small ravine in the foreground.

Picking three Honorable Mentions was no easy chore either, Stuckey acknowledged.

He chose another flower close-up, this one of a tiger lily, taken by Marie Brooks of RR 2 Acton, along with another Diane Evans entry showing a young boy reaching into a stream, and Tili Jago's strong entry of a unicorn ornament silhouetted against an outdoor backdrop.

A Clare Ct. resident, Jago used her Zeiss Ikon 35-mm camera to take the unicorn and two different horse shots.

Floral close-ups were a popular item among shutterbugs this year, but Stuckey pointed out that sharp contrast between the central subject and its preferably out-of-focus background is essential. Vivid colors and crisp focus on the foreground subject are what make the winners, he said.

Pay careful attention to your depth of field, Stuckey recommends, and try playing with out-of-focus foreground objects for long shots, or vice versa for close-ups.

Other entrants in this year's contest included Marg Aitken of RR 3 Acton, Jan Quirk of RR 1 Limehouse and Charles Wright of Churchill Rd. South.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK
BREAD PUDDING

2 cups milk
2 1/2 cups soft bread crumbs
3 eggs
1/4 cup sugar
1 tsp. allspice
2 tbsp. molasses
4 tbsp. brown sugar

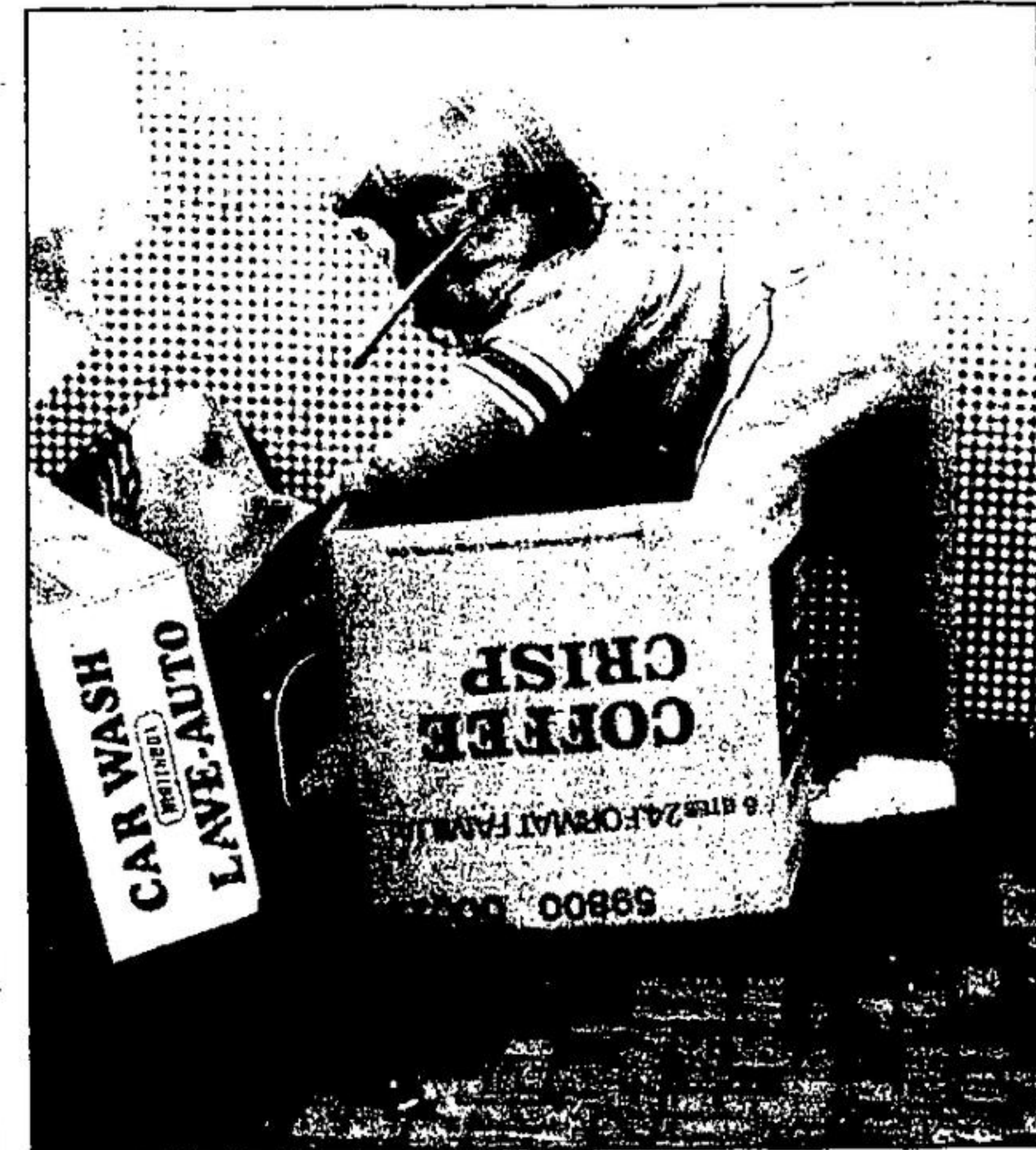
Scald milk, then pour it over bread crumbs. Beat 3 egg yolks and 1 egg white together. Combine 1/4 cup sugar, 1 tsp. allspice and 2 tbsp. molasses. Add to beaten eggs and blend. Combine with bread crumbs and mix. Place in greased baking dish. Cook 50 minutes at 350°. Then cover with meringue of 2 egg whites and 4 tbsp. sugar. Brown slightly. (Spread with jam before adding meringue if desired.)
