there seems a lack of substance there. We'll see.

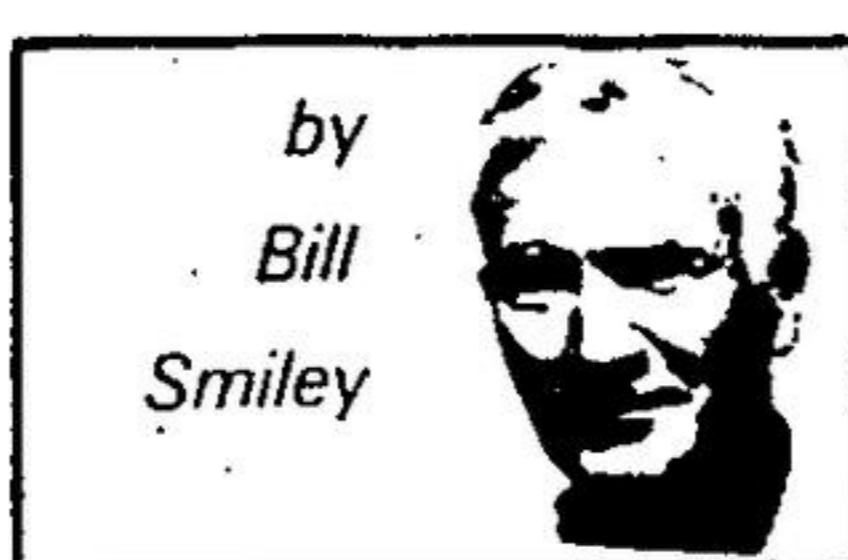

Want more? Okay. The provinces will continue to bicker among themselves and with the federal government. There will be massive strikes, always called at the most inconvenient moment for the public. This will produce a hardening on the part of government, leading to more confrontation rather than conciliation.

Our great imbalance in tourism will continue, perhaps grow. Despite the groans of Canadians, they will still flock

There's no other country in the world I'd rather live in, and I've seen a few.

That's enough of the Cassandra bit. Let's end on a lighter note. I came across something on the sports page that I must share. It was in the Toronto Star, which is not noted for its proofreading skills.

It seems that a Toronto golfer of whom I've never heard, called Jerry Anderson, placed second in the West German Open golf tournament. He made page seven in the sports section. Jolly good, Jerry, considering your handicap.

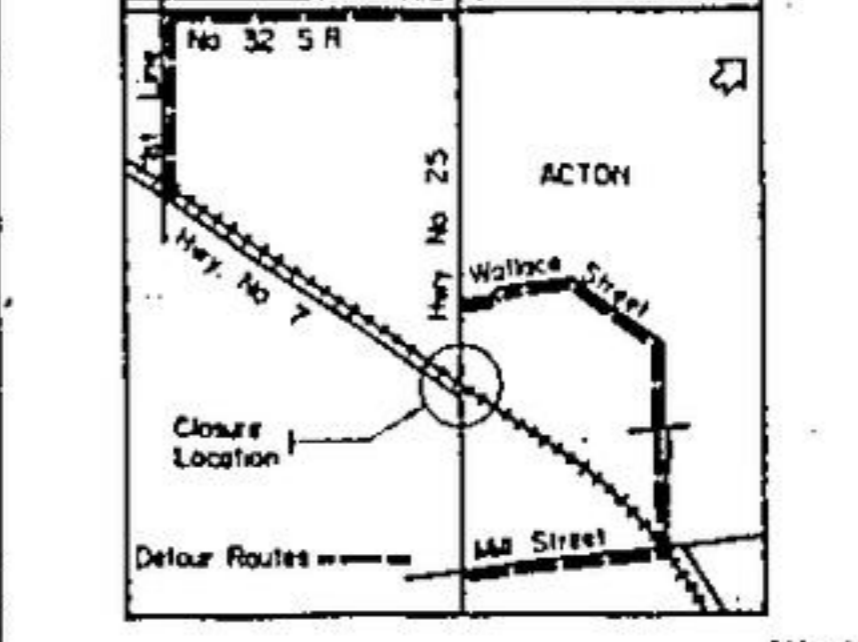
