Maureen McTeer almost made it, but her consort kept trying to ram both feet in his mouth at once, and stubbornly refused to discuss the weather.

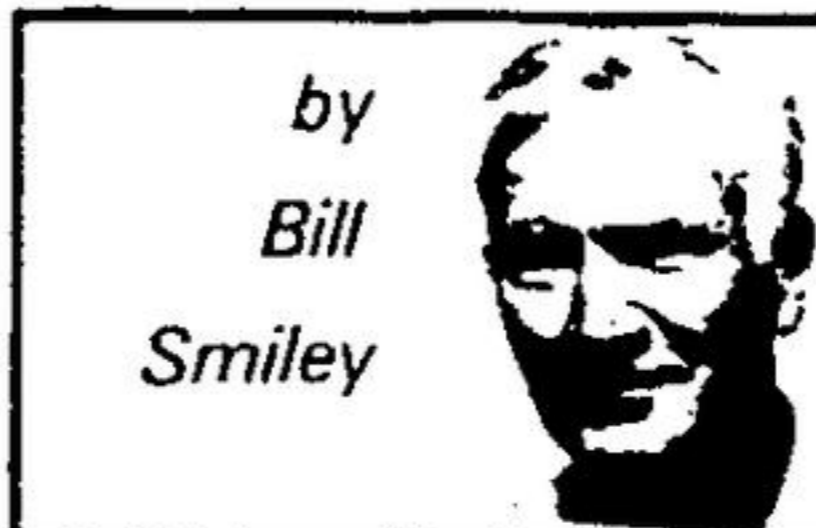
