Police blotter

Cash stolen

Police report \$500 was taken from the Sit 'N' Bull Tavern Saturday after 2 a.m. Entry was gained by forcing a balcony window open.

Permits down \$3 mil. but industrial total up

Housing starts in Halton Hills continue to lag behind last year, with a total value of \$2.7 million until the end of September compared to \$5.1 million last year. The overall total shows a \$3 million drop in permits from last year. This year's total is \$7 million compared to \$11 million last year. But industrial and commercial building is well ahead of the same nine months in 1983. An addition, costing \$750,000 at Building Products, in Acton, and renovations totalling \$30,000 at The Olde Hide House,

Acton, helped boost these totals to \$2.5 million, until the end of September compared to \$978,170 at the same time last year. Alterations and additions to homes continue to be a popular way to gain extra space. This year 207 such permits have been issued compared to 198 last year. So far this year the Town has collected \$48,038 in building permits, \$7,623 in plumbing permits, and \$52,500 in lot levies. In addition Halton Region has collected \$49,950 in lot levies.

Seek zoning amendment for temporary second home

Interested parties have another day to declare their opposition to an application by an area couple to build a temporary second residence on their Esquering property. Roy and June Warner of Lot 17, Concession 2, were on hand at a recent public meeting on their application for a zoning bylaw amendment to allow for the second home for their son. He will carry on farming their property on Hwy. 25 at 17 Sideroad. No objections were offered by those in the gallery at the special Town council meeting. The proposed residence would be a mobile

home and the permit would expire after three years. Deadline for formal, written objections is tomorrow (Thursday). Council will rule on the application next Monday night.

Catherine (Kaye) Roszell ran shop here 45 years

A well-known and popular Acton resident, Catherine Elizabeth (Kaye) Roszell died Sept. 1 at the Inglebrook Nursing Home in Fergus after almost two years of failing health. She was 94. She was born Dec. 15, 1889 in Erin Township, the only daughter of George and Selma Roszell. She attended Woodside S.S. in Erin Township. Miss Roszell was best known locally as the

proprietor—45 years—of The Kaye Shoppe, originally housed in the former post office on Mill St. and later on Willow St. in the front part of her home, where she lived almost 70 years.

Miss Roszell took pride in the high quality of her store's wool and cotton goods and catered to the needs of local embroiderers as well as selling gifts. The Kaye Shoppe used to be the best place to go for ladies' hats in town.

Besides her parents, Miss Roszell was predeceased by both of her brothers, Garfield of Regina and David of Indian Head, Sask., and by two nephews, Jack of Abernethy, Sask., and George of Indian Head.

She is survived by nieces Marguerite Patterson and Belly-Maye Roszell, both of Acton, great-niece Carol Patterson of Walkerton and three nieces in western Canada: Alice McCall of Melville, Sask., Laura Burton of Vancouver and Dorothy Powell of Regina.

Rev. Craig Cribar of Knox Presbyterian Church conducted a funeral service from Shoemaker Funeral Home in Acton. Interment followed at Fairview Cemetery, where pallbearers were family friends William Cameron of Goderich, Glenn Banks of Hanover, Brian Skerrett and Harvey Tuffin of Guelph, Ray Thompson of Silvercreek and William Thompson of Acton.

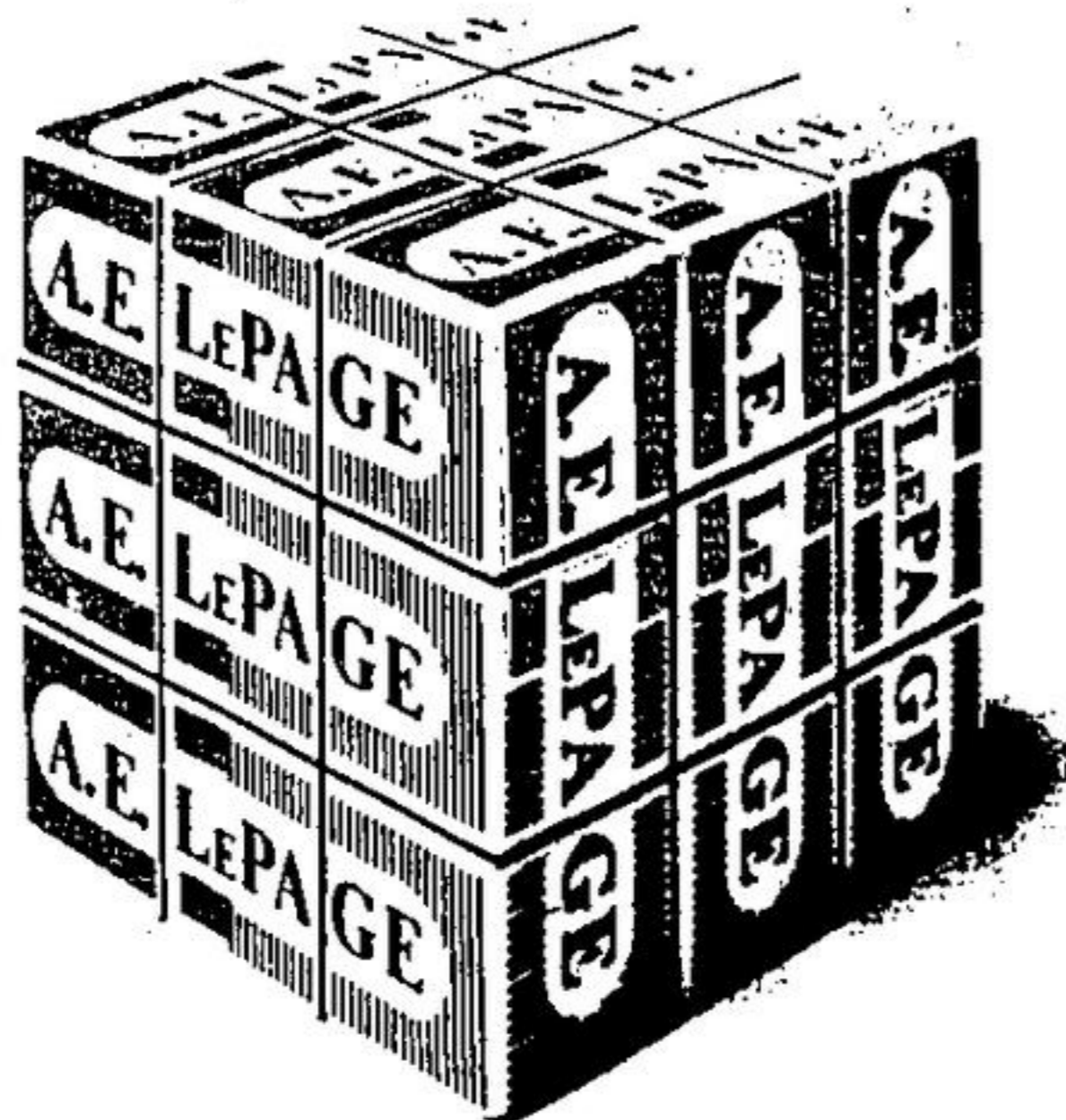
