Burlington seeks self promotion

Regional government is facing another serious challenge over Burlington's ambition to handle its own business development, a move which at least two of the city's councillors have termed "very divisive."

Mayor Russ Miller said last week he is "really upset" over Burlington city council's narrowly-approved resolution outlining the city's hopes of taking its business development duties away from the Region and handling them internally.

Of chief concern is Burlington's desire to have the Region return the city's portion of a business deelopment levy routinely contributed by the four area municipalities to finance Halton's efforts to attract new industry.

The resolution was Burlington's response to Halton's newley-proposed delegation bylaw for business development, which incorporates new directions from the province.

Recent Provincial legislation allows the area municipalities to handle their own business development affairs as long as there is no duplication of efforts at the Regional level. Halton Hills, Oakville and Milton have already indicated their support for the Regional busunesssdevelopment program.

"We've beef a Region for ten years trying to get it to work," Mayor Miller told this newspaper last week. "The Region is there to support the smaller municipalities. (Burlington's resolution) is just another way of destroying the Regional government. I say if we can't get something done as a

Region, then let's do away with it." Saying he is "really upset" about Burlington's parochialism, Miller recalled that he was never a great proponent of regional government at its outset a decade

"But if you give me something to work with, I think we should make a go of it," he said.

Councillor Mike Armstrong, a member of the Region's administration and finance committee, which voted last week to table ' the matter for further discussion, acknowledged that at some point, an area municipality must have a hand in its business development, but under the auspices of the Region.

"Duality of service must enter into the picture eventually," he told this newspaper, "but to want a charge-back (returned levies) takes away from the while concept of regional government. We in Halton Hills are quite happy with the way things are."

A member of the former Town of Georgetown's business development committee until it disbanded about ten years ago, Armstrong said Halton Hills currently has no such body, relying instead on its planning department to assess any pertinent plans.

Awaiting approval for new urban boundaries that would put 300 acres of industrial land within the Georgetown planning area, Halton Hills will one day depend heavily on the Regional department, he said.

Armstrong's suspicion that the Burlington resolution did not receive anything close to unanimous support was backed up at last Wednesday's administration committee meeting. Burlington councilors Joan Little, Walter Mulkewich, Jim Grieve and Rob Forbesshad little if any defence for the move, forcing the committee to await comment from Burlington Mayor Roly Bird or the city's chief administrator, Mike Box.

Little called the Burlington resolution, approved the night previous, "a backward step" and "very divisive action," a comment supported by Forbes

Wellington NDP picks Sandy Young

With a Progressive Conservative candidate ready to go and the Liberals still to choose one, Wellington-Dufferin-Peel's New Democrats have settled on W.A. (Sandy) Young as their man in the next provincial election.

Young was acclaimed at a nomination meeting last Wednesday night at Wellington Place near Fergus, where guest speaker was Lynn McDonald, the Broadview-Greenwood MP who twice defeated Tory contender Peter Worthington.

Young was Wellington-Dufferin-Simcoe's NDP candidate in the Sept. 4 federal election, giving the party its best showing ever in a race that saw Conservative Perrin

Beatty re-elected. Incumbent MP Jack Johnson was recently acclaimed as Conservative candidate in the next provincial election. The riding's Liberals will wait until after the Ontario isadership race before choosing their candidate.


