

The Acton Public Library is hoping to have its after-hours book deposit installed before the end of the year.

Chief librarian Betsy Cornwell told the Free Press last week that the Ottawa-made book drop is on order and a Georgetown glassworker is ready to modify the library's front window to fit.

Faced with perennial complaints from patrons who are unable to return their books during regular library hours, the Halton Hills Library Board ended several months' deliberation in September by voting to install book drops at both the Acton and

Georgetown libraries. While the lay-out of the Georgetown library demands a special exterior deposit vault with steel casing, Acton's will resemble an oversize mail slot in the large window pane to the left of the front door.

Focusing on volunteerism, the medals will be presented in a series of ceremonies across the Province Dec. 9, bringing often overdue credit to citizens active in sports, the arts, recreation and health. 

Acton

The central service at the downtown cenotaph outside Trinity United Church will see some 34 wreaths laid in memory of Acton's 42 war dead. The Legion parade featuring special guests forms at the post office on Bower Ave. at 10.15 a.m. and marches to the cenotaph.

Most participants will attend a Remembrance Day service inside Trinity Church following the laying of wreaths and a moment of silence. Harry Norton is in charge of arrangements.

The Lorne Scots honor guard and band and 197 Squadron of the Royal Canadian Air Cadets will join the Acton Citizens Band, area Scout and Guide groups and government representatives to hear the names of the war dead read aloud by John McHugh. Trinity's Rev. Don Matheson will deliver the benediction and Citizens Band director George Elliott will play "Last Post."

Twenty-one young Actonians lost their lives in each of the world wars, but none in the Korean conflict. One serviceman killed in the line of duty is not mentioned on the cenotaph: flight officer R. Rolston was killed in a peacetime training accident.

Rockwood

In Rockwood, newly-elected Wellington MP Bill Winegarden will be guest speaker at an inter-denominational church service at Rockmosa Community Hall following the Remembrance Day ceremony at the Hwy. 7 cenotaph.

Max Storey is organizing the 11 a.m. ceremony to follow a march from the old firehall. Eramosa Township Reeve Murray Cox will join veterans, guests and dignitaries, along with local Scouting groups, to pay their respects and hear vocalist Gordon Burnett and a local bugler.

Haltonville

Nassagaweya Township focuses on the Guelph Line cenotaph in Haltonville, just south of Brookville, to honor its 28 war dead. A contingent from Branch 197 will lay a wreath at the 3.30 p.m. service, as will Milton Mayor Gordon Krantz and a provincial representative. Brookville schoolchildren will join in for prayers and observe a moment of silence.
