Business committee proposal deferred

With the Georgetown Chamber of Commerce "heartily" endorsing the idea, Town council will consider establishing a business development committee in two weeks, once the Region has sorted out its own affairs in that field.

The man behind the idea, Mayor Russ Miller, was not at all happy about the motion for deferral cutting off his chance to elaborate on the idea. By law, a call for deferral pre-empts further discussion on an item. Miller said he was "very disappointed."

"It has been my view for some time that the Town should endeavor to approach the need for business development within the community on a more aggressive basis," Miller said in a report to council Monday

He suggested that a business development committee, made up of five plus the mayor and a councillor, interested citizens appointed by council, and using Town funds, try and attract new business to Halton Hills, improve communication among the existing businesses and provide lialson between the Town and the business community.

Miller pointed out that Regional councillors will this week be discussing a new bylaw which could see Burlington assume full control over its business development,

relieving the Region of its involvement. "It would appear that in either case, a greater emphasis will be placed on the area municipalities to become involved in

business development," Miller reported. Asked by Councillor Harry Levy about Halton Hills' annual contribution to the Regional business development department, clerk-administrator Ken Richardson explained that the four area municipalities each pay \$10,000 a year to cover the cost of "global advertising" aimed at attracting

business from around the world. After one meeting among staff from the four municipalities he said, the Town is not ready to make a commitment to the program for 1985.

Councillor John McDonald told colleagues he received "a couple of calls" from concerned members of a local Chamber of Commerce. He said he managed to satisfy their concerns.

In a letter to Miller, Georgetown Chamber president Dave Kentner said his group 'heartily endorses any action to improve communication" between the Town and the chamber.

Council agreed with Councillor Mike Armstrong that the Town's next move on the proposal should wait two weeks, until the issue of Regional involvement in business development has been resolved.
