## Erin twp. residents to receive medals

Former Erin Township Reeve Lloyd Lang is one of three Erin township residents who will receive the Ontario Bicentennial medals. Maureen McFee of RR 2, Hillsburgh and Fred Overland of Hillsburgh are the other two who will receive the honor.

The recipients of medals were selected by their communities and through public nominations during Bicentennial year.

The medals, made of Ontario nickel and gold, feature the Ontario Coat of Arms on one side and the Bicentennial symbol on the reverse side.

Mr. Lang was honored for the many years of service he gave to the Erin Agricultural Society of which he has been president. Mrs. McFee is a member of the Women's Institute and served as president several times. Mr. Overland has maintained the grounds at Victoria Park and drives cancer patients to the hospitals for treatment.

The medals are intended for the many volunteers who give time and effort to service for their community. Recipients, 1,984 of them across Ontario include volunteer firefighters, athletic coaches, fund raisers, doctors, teachers and nurses.

## Harding wants return of capital punishment

Halton Regional Police chief James Harding has joined the growing number of police officials to demand the return of capital punishment following the recent rash of police killings in Ontario.

Harding believes the recent tragic killings are enough to "convince even the most timid of people that a strong stand must be taken in support of law enforcement."

The strong stand Harding refers to includes the return of capital punishment.

"Not because we like it (capital punishment), but because it is necessary," said the police chief.

Harding also believes an emphasis must be placed on training police officers to "streetproof" them against becoming victims of unnecessary violence.

The recent police killings have placed an

increased amount of stress on police officers across Canada. Harding is concerned the stress may affect the officers and their families.

But he believes it is important for the officers "not to react to the passion of their grief, but respond to the situation to the best of their professional standards."

"Our concerns and our fears are best dealt with by insuring that we are trained to the highest of professional standards. It is that which the public respects in its police and it is that which the public will support in its police," said Harding.

Some people fear that the recent police killings may force the police to shoot first and ask questions later, but Harding said he has enough confidence and pride in his men to know that thought is as offensive to them as it would be to any rational man.

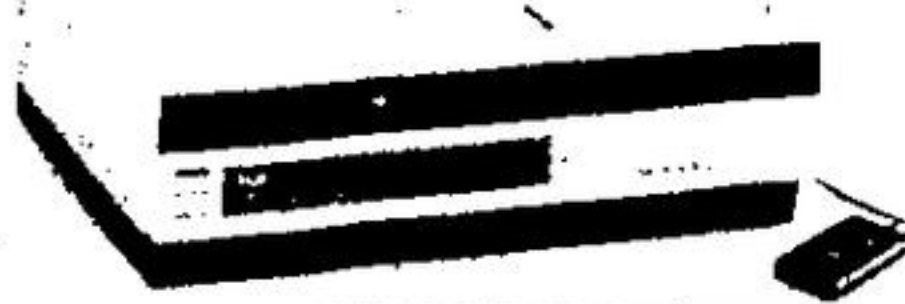

## Region sets criteria for cultural grants

Faced with a handful of applications for cultural grants, Halton Region has drafted specific criteria to help streamline the annual process.

Halton's four area municipalities will be asked to comment on the extensive criteria before a final decision is made.

Among the proposed rules:

—grant approval in no way constitutes a commitment to future funding;

—applicants not funded by other levels of government get top priority;

—applicants can continue making individual appeals before council or its committees;

—applicants have until the last Friday of November each year to submit requests, except this year, when the deadline is January 15, 1985.

Chief administrative officer Dennis Perlin told the planning and public works committee last week that a number of Ontario municipalities have recently developed specific criteria for grants. He noted that the majority do not fund applicants based outside their areas, as Halton does in the case of Hamilton's Royal Botanical Gardens.

The horticultural complex received 80 per cent of the \$217,500 which Halton meted out to six "cultural" groups this year, he said.

According to the proposed criteria, eligibility for cultural grants will be limited to non-profit groups engaged in vocal or instrumental music, dance or theatre for the enjoyment of the public. Groups outside the performing arts that nevertheless offer "a unique benefit" to Halton residents may qualify for special service grants.

Tourism grants would be available to non-profit groups that promote and develop Halton's tourist industry.

Grant "sub-categories" offer funds to groups launching new cultural programs, continuing their role in the community or staging a special event.
