She makes dolls Grandma cuddled

Dolls are making a big come-back and porcelain dolls are at the top of the list. Until approximately 50 years ago every little girl cuddled a porcelain doll, but now

it's the grown-ups who covet them. Antique porecelain dolls are fetching big prices, and are being recommended as one collector's item which will keep pace with inflation.

The resurgence of interest in the peaches and cream complexioned dolls, with the eyes which close when put down to sleep, not only stirs memories in a lot of women, but has prompted at least some of them toreproduce what were toys in another era.

But toys they are not any more as the hobbyists not only make the dolls, but spend painstaking hours dressing them in the authentic costumes of their particular time. These too are being snapped up, but seldom as gifts for children.

June Lerch is one who has rediscovered the art of dollmaking and her fascination with them is reflected in the number and variety of dolls which surround her in her Dawson Crescent home. She is passing on

her knowledge and joy in the art to ten eager students at the moment. She also sells some but admits she does it reluctantly.

Twelve years she first tried her hand at ceramics and was hooked, eventually opening Juno's Ceramics on Armstrong Avenue, but lately China-painted porcelain dolls have become a major interest.

She does it all, starting from buying the mold and pouring the muddy looking mixture called alip into them. But the featureless faces have to have eye sockets cut in. If it's one of these appealing dolls with the half-open mouth, that little girls used to stick tiny baby's bottles in then that, too, must be cut out.

After firing in a very hot kiln for porcelain the head is polished with fine sandpaper, then those ruby lips and pink cheeks are painted on. After more firings for the china painted doll, the eyelashes are painted on. one by one. Sometimes this can take a whole afternoon.

After that these bright flirtatious eyes are set in first with a pliable wax, then with plaster of paris.

At this point the doll 'ain't got nobody," so a soft, composite or porcelain body, is added, depending on the era of the original doll. Must antique dolls had composition bodies. All June's dolls are exact reproductions of antique dolls, down to each item of clothing.

Antique dolls had a type of halimark on the back of the neck to show who made it and June puts her initials and the year on her dolls so they cannot be passed off as antiques.

Most dolls are strung together with elastic and a hook and come in five or six pieces, including arms and legs. But some, such as the Shirley Temple doll, which was the apple of every child's eye when the little movie star was singing On the Good Ship Lollipop, and was dancing and crying her way into everyone's heart, comes in 17 pieces. This is due to ball joints in her arms and legs.

When the cascading curly wigs go on the doll is finished, and the time-consuming task of making the delicate dresses, cloaks and even little muffs begins.

The dollmaker becomes a scrounger as

she searches for sating, silks, velvets and lace. Old costume jewellery becomes a bonanza for the tiny necklaces every welldressed old-fashioned doll must wear.

June's dolls are modelled primarily on

French and German dolls from the 1880s to 1929, when porcelain dolls faded from the scene. But if she and others like her caught up in the rebirth of hand-painted china dolls have their way, they wil come back to their former glory.

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
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
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
