

"fragile" financial situation. The proposed funding by the government has not been implemented and they are uncertain when it will be. Therefore the Board has offered no increase in salary. Harries has recommended to the two sides an increase between 2.5-3 per cent since all settlements with other separate school CHRISTMAS! boards to date have averaged 2.9 per cent. Harries added that this year is not the year to close the salary gap with the Halton elementary school teachers.

Harries has also recommended that uncertificated teaching experience be entitled to recognition for incremental purposes, earned leave recognition for good attendance be not implemented and board contributions for OHIP premiums, extended health benefit plan, group life insurance and dental care be increased from 85 per cent to 95 per cent with the Sept. 1, 1984 premium.

Harries concluded that a mediator is necessary to resolve many of the differences even though "many of the items are subtle wording changes and in many cases are distinctions without a difference."

The Board and the teachers have met eight times since last February to June 11. Harries was appointed Sept. 19 and the two sides have met two times since then.

#### **Bateman print** first prize in library draw

One of five prints of an etching by wildlife artist, Robert Bateman donated to Halton Hills Public Libraries earlier this year will be offered to the public in a lucky Xmas draw, sponsored by the Friends of the Library.

Tickets on the valuable etching are now on sale and a draw for the lucky winner will be made a few days before Christmas.


The unique etching of a "Chickadee in a Pine Tree" is the first etching ever done by the artist. It was produced to mark the opening of an exhibition of his work held at the Library-Cultural Centre in June. The value of the work has yet to be determined. At the moment, there are only a handful of prints in circulation, but a few more are expected to be released.

"We were thrilled when Mr. Bateman presented our organization with five prints," says Doug Magwood, chairman of The Friends. "One etching has been framed and will hang in the Georgetown Library's permanent collection, and a second print is being offered in the draw, so that everyone in the area of Halton Hills will have a chance to own a Bateman original."


"We will give further consideration to the remaining prints in 1985," says the chairman. "Certainly they will be used to aid and assist our libraries in Acton and Georgetown in the best way we can find. The work of the libraries is important to everyone, yet the Library Board has only limited funds and needs our assistance."

The Friends organization was established in 1983, holding their first draw for a wildlife painting by a local artist last Christmas. The new group also sponsored the very successful exhibition, Robert Bateman-the Early Years which hing in the gallery for two months.

The framed black-and-white etching which is being offered in this year's draw will be on display at various functions in Halton Hills during the coming weeks and at the libraries in Acton and Georgetown
