This week, I was about to go out on my first date in a year: a dinner date with a lady. When I called and told her she'd have

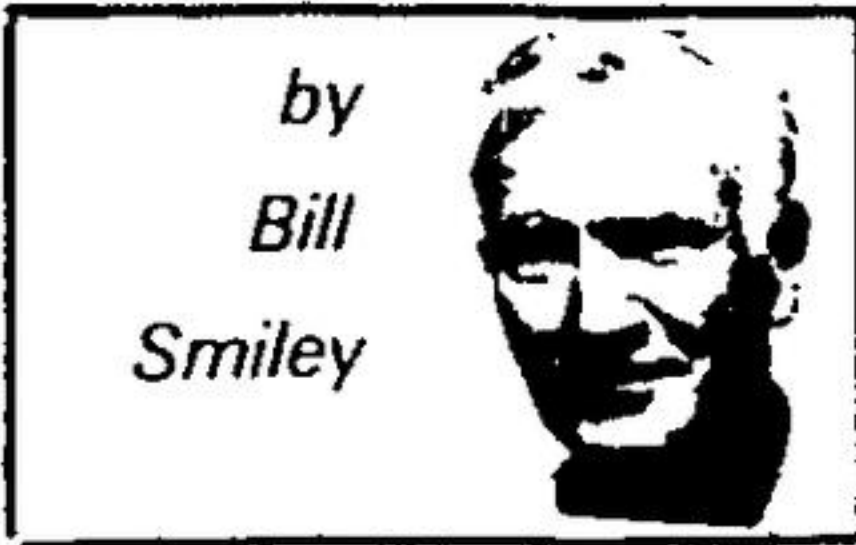
to take a raincheck because I wasn't well, it was more like old times. She was even less sympathetic than my wife used to be. She didn't believe a word I said.
