Severance bid uncovers patch of unzoned land on Wallace St.

Town planning staff have discovered an 11-acre triangle of land off Wallace St. that has no zoning whatever. An "initial graphics omission," presumably by municipal staff of a bygone era, was blamed for the oversight. Council sanctioned the severance Monday night on

the condition that it will be properly zoned first. Deputy planning director Bruce McLean explained that a recent report from the Region about a severance application by the owner of the property disclosed the problem. Owner William Acri wants to sever the 11-acre parcel just east of Commerce Cres. from a 105-acre section that makes up part of Lots 29 and 30 in Concession 3.

The south end belonged to Acton and was designated "industrial" and "conservation". A review of the zoning bylaws indicated that the north end was never actually zoned because cartographers delineating Esquesing Township failed to include the southerly jog in the boundary line. Both north and south ends would be included in one proposed lot if the severance is approved, but staff immediately noted the possibility of a building permit request for land that is not zoned. The Town solicitor verified staff concerns.

Two more weeks' shooting on 'Agnes'

With only two more weeks to go in the local filming schedule, Jane Fonda was back at the Rockwood Academy Saturday to continue work on "Agnes of God". The actress-turned-activist-turned-fitness expert-turned-actress again was spotted there by Acton's resident film authority, David Giammarco, whose interviews with stars and forthcoming book about James Bond were the subjects of a Free Press feature last week. The 16-year old Erin High School student was on the Academy set to interview production designer Ken Adams. Responsible for turning the historic Academy into a Quebec nunnery, complete with chapel and bell tower, Adams turned directors' dreams into reality for most of the Bond films. As such, his insights and expertise about the special effects and exotic locales that surrounded Sean Connery and Roger Moore

in the Ian Fleming adventures are a natural chapter for Giammarco's collector's book about the Bond movies. Adams told Giammarco that filming at the Academy should be completed in another two weeks. Director Norman Jewison will then lead cast and crew to the increasingly popular production studio at Kleinburg for another week or two. While you're scanning the movie listings for the release of "Agnes of God" next year, keep an eye on the non-fiction best-sellers' list for Giammarco's Bond book. David acknowledged this week that next June would be an ideal time for Avon Books to release his compilation. That's when James Bond next hits the big screen in "A View to a Kill", starring Roger Moore. That should give David time to include both his interview with Ken Adams and a second interview he's hoping to conduct with Moore next month.

Daycare needed here, but where and how?

A group of people in the community are getting together to try to assess the child care needs of Acton. "We know there are needs (for a daycare centre), but we can go many different ways with the facilities and we're trying to find the organizational structure that will meet people's needs," says Acton High School principal Karel Sury, a member of the task force. Sue Barns, the high school's head of Student Services, and Ruth Wilson, head of the Creative Arts Department, initiated the investigation after talking to parents and single-parent students who have expressed their need for daycare service. The group has been asking for input from the public as to what sort of facility they think would be most beneficial.

"We can go right to providing meals for the kids," says Sury, "or we can have parents involved in a co-operative approach." The group has held one meeting and will be holding a second next week to discuss any suggestions they get from Actonians. Representatives from Halton Region will also be present at the meeting.
