Don't Be Shy, No One is Looking

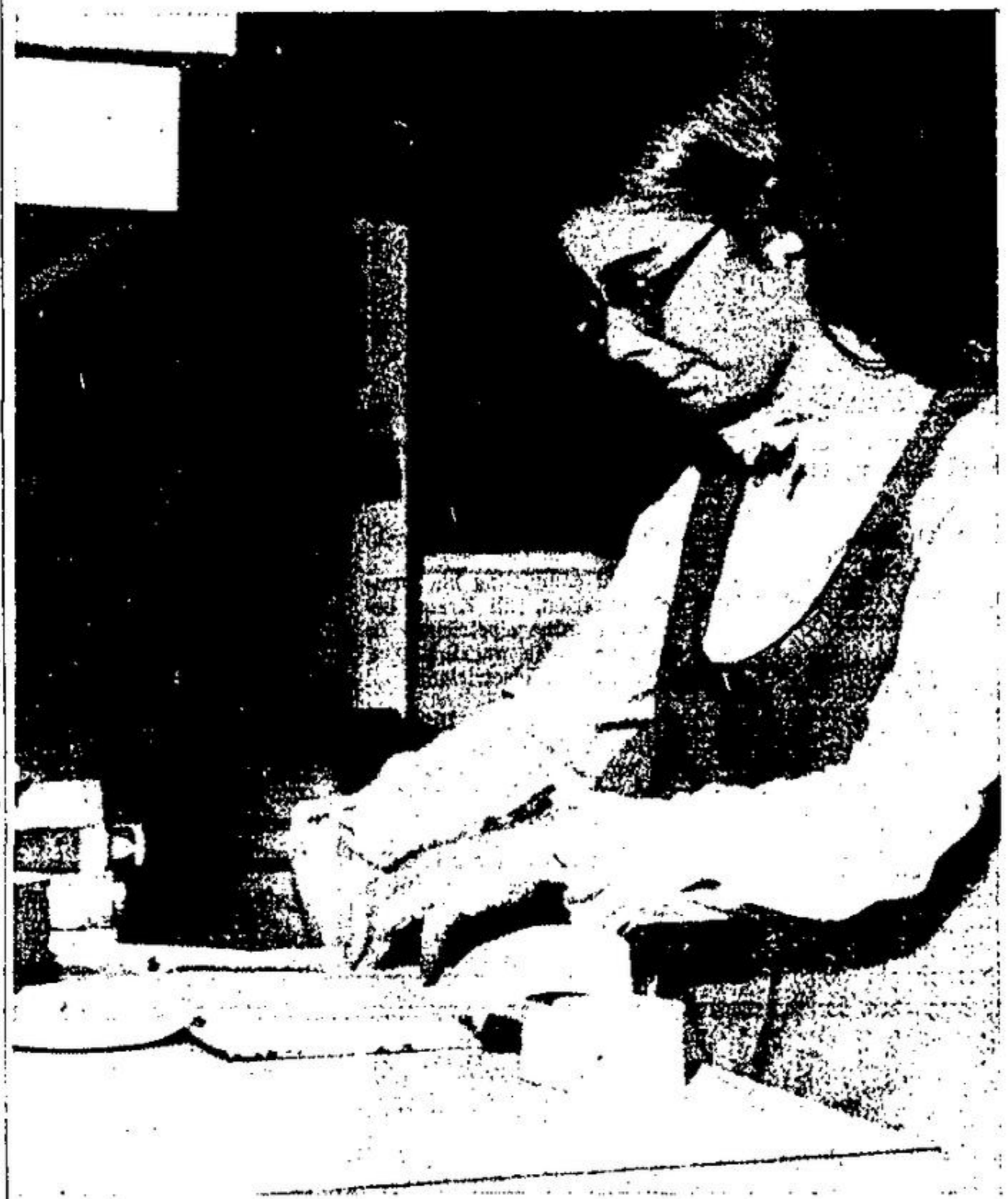
'Forgiveness Week' at the library was anything but an outstanding success. Only a very few recent books were placed in the large box outside the library.
