



# On Facing Death

"How blest are those who mourn: they shall be given courage"

Happy were the families untouched by grief in 1969. And yet within a space of a decade most of us suffer the loss of a family member or dear friend. How soon after a death does the world seem to forget but for you the pain goes on, you cannot forget. The death of a loved one is a painful experience involving loneliness and, perhaps, fear, guilt and hostility.

Facing the loneliness and talking about it will help you. This is where your small circle of intimate friends can help. Talk to them about your sorrow and the warm memories you have of your loved one. What you cannot tell your friends you can tell your pastor or to God himself. God is our Father and He knows all our good points and our failings. He knows that you will have feelings of guilt and petty worries. These must be swept away if we are to re-establish ourselves within the community.

At such times you may become hostile with your friends, your family physician or with God, blaming them for a great variety of difficulties, even for death itself. This is the way of rebellion, it leaves one cynical, uncharitable and warped. Eventually it may lead you to despise yourself. There is another way. It is the way of acceptance. The death has happened and it is beyond your power to change it. But your life can change and grow because of that fact. There is meaning in all the ways of the infinite God. There are, after all, many others around you who bear similar marks of pain. And so the healing must come from the inside. As a help in the healing process a disciplined and ordered life is necessary. The palliatives you may have turned to have no lasting value and they cannot save you. Continue with your work at the earliest moment but make no major decisions now while your perspective is out of focus.

Bereavement brings many problems but they cannot be ignored or run away from. They can, however, be solved if you turn to Christ because He knows your grief and He can share it with you. There can be Christian joy in death when we understand and believe that whatever has value in God's sight is safe for evermore.
