Protest Theme of Ancient War Earthy Play

"Lysistrata" the earthy Georgetown Little Theatre production, running January 15, 16, 17 in Wrigglesworth school, shows 'war protesters' are no modern innovation.

The ancient Greek play by Aristophanes, depicts the women of Athens withholding their favours from their husbands as protest against the continuance of a war.

Directed by Ron Hill this play has the largest cast of any Little Theatre production to date. The 35 member cast, dressed in Greek costumes designed by John Sommer, work on a three level stage. The small Wrigglesworth auditorium stage has been extended into the audience on two levels below the existing stage creating a Stratford-like effect in audience intimacy.

Saturday night, an adjudicator for the Central Ontario Drama League will judge the shows merits. Any further competition in this year's Drama Festival will depend on his words.

Some of the main characters in the Athenian play are Lysistrata, Jean Wakefield; the Magistrate, Bob Thornley; Calonice, Judy Gooding; Myrrhine, Isla McConnell; Cinesias Des Nicholas; Spartan Herald, George Mitchell.

The costumes were made by Eileen Smith, and the show produced by Harry Haylock.

Building Code Mandatory . . .

Snow's Efforts Mean Lower Building Costs

A report presented last week to the municipal affairs department gives full support to Halton East MPP James Snow's proposal that the National Building Code be made mandatory throughout Ontario.

Snow introduced a private member's bill in the Legislature in March, 1968 calling for adoption of the code.

Last week the report of Committee on Uniform Building Standards for Ontario was introduced at a news conference by Municipal Affairs Minister Darcy McKeough and his recommendations are almost identical to those made by Snow. The committee was formed after Snow made his resolution.

BUILDING COST

C. D. Carruthers, committee chairman, suggested that adoption of the code would lower the basic building cost of an average home in Toronto, for example, by as much as \$500.

Snow said, in an interview, adoption of the code would definitely result in savings but added it is difficult to estimate what the savings would be.

The National Building Code sets standards for construction safety and quality of materials. At present each Ontario municipality has its own standards although some of them are based on the National Code.

Advises Drivers 'Get Breath Sample'

Drivers forced to take a breathalyzer test should be given a sample of their breath to have it tested independently.

Peter McWilliams former Halton County crown attorney said this week that although this was to be part of the original breathalyzer legislation, it was not passed because containers have not been found.

ALWAYS SKEPTICS

Not giving a suspect a sample of his own breath to confirm or challenge police findings leaves a 'serious gap in the protection afforded a citizen,' the lawyer said, because 'there will always be skeptics who suspect police of giving a false reading or certificate.'

McWilliams made it clear that the intent of the breath test law is good and that the problem of drinking drivers is not being over-stressed.

45 PER CENT

He said that statistics he compiled in Halton County over a seven year period showed that drinking drivers caused 30 per cent of all fatal accidents and as high as 45 per cent of traffic deaths. The death toll percentage is higher, he said, because drinking drivers 'tended to cause the ghastly multiple fatal' accidents.

In one year, the former crown attorney said, 80 per cent of the drivers involved in fatal crashes had been drink-

ing to a level considerably above .08.

Georgetown police chief Harley Lowe said his dept. will be equipped with a breathalyzer next month.

Year's Probation On Burglary Tool Charge

Two youths received suspended sentences and one year's probation in provincial court for possession of burglary tools when they appeared in court last week.

Both pleaded not guilty to the charge which resulted from the discovery of a half ton truck with tire irons, a wrecking bar, cotton gloves, chisels and other items in it September 20 on the premises of Maveal Motors on Guelph Street.

Howard Hamilton, then a mechanic employed there, testified he arrived at the lot shortly before 11 p.m. and noticed a half ton truck at the gas pumps. One of the accused was standing near a line of used cars. The other later appeared from behind the cars.

Hamilton subsequently noted the rear window of the garage had been taped and broken, the window lock turned, and the garage entered. Proprietor Fred Maveal later testified he was called by Hamilton and when he arrived at the garage found someone had gone through it picking up various tools.

Georgetown Constable Kenneth Firth said he found a number of tools on the floor of the accused's truck, including a wrecking bar, tire irons, two hammers, two pair of pliers, a set of socket wrenches and other wrenches.

CHARGE THREE IN SCHOOL THEFTS

Three Georgetown high school students have been charged in connection with a series of thefts at the school dating back over a month during which time they had possession of two pass keys.

Some of the loot including a \$500 adding machine and an expensive stop watch have been recovered by police. Still being sought in the continuing investigation are several other items including another watch and sports equipment. A sum of money was also taken.

One of the charged youths was discovered opening a school library door with a pass key. Georgetown police were called in to investigate when the latest items were found missing Friday.

The three charged will appear in juvenile court.
