



Disagrees, Wants Terra Cotta Roads Improved

Terra Cotta, Ont.

Dear Sir: May I ask one question? How many of the Save Terra Cotta from terrible so-called destruction by putting a decent high way through here have lived here more than five or ten years. I am one of the many in the village that have lived her for 36 years and have been waiting for the last 15 for a decent safe road to drive on. On a busy weekend I have seen it take half an hour to drive half a mile to the general store. Cars parked on the road in fant of the Terra Cotta Inn never seem to realize what No Parking signs mean, yet let me go into the city and park by one and see what happens.

In a petition that was taken up in the latter part of 1969, a so-called 300 signed this. Again may I ask, how many people from Terra Cotta signed this? Why should people from all over Ontario tell us what should happen to this road when they might only travel it once or twice a year, and when they do especially on a weekend turn it into a hazardous stretch of road.

The Forge that some people are trying to conserve would look much better with the highway going right through the middle of it.

If people from the city are trying to conserve the so-called beautiful country side then let them do so by staying in the city and building their homes instead of cluttering them all over the country. There are shacks like the Forge and hundreds of them for people to see lying empty that homesteaders left between Cochrane and Hearst in the north country.

In closing this letter I say to you the Terra Cotta Preservation Committee, not everybody in Terra Cotta, is opposed to this new road.
