SNOWMOBILE LEGISLATION PLANNED

Snowmobile enthusiasts will be restricted to operating their machines in town limits to the hours between 9 a.m. and 11 p.m., when a by-law ordered Monday by Georgetown council becomes law.

The by-law will ban snowmobiling on all school grounds and public parks, except the fair grounds.
