

# Burlington Cops Title, Best Tournament Player Award

Burlington Midgets were giants in Georgetown's fourth annual Midget hockey tournament which concluded Saturday night. The formula which earned the title for the Burlington club was three wins and a tie in four tries.

The tie came in the second round of the three day tourney when the champs and Hespler battled to a three-all dead lock. Shots on goal in an overtime period allowed Burlington to progress.

They handled Camp Borden 5-2 in the semi-final Saturday afternoon and won a 4-2 verdict over Detroit's Myr Metal team in the Grand Championship final Saturday night.

Fittingly it was a Burlington defenseman Smith who was judged the tournament's most valuable player and first recipient of the Bill Chapman Memorial Trophy.

Brampton, after losing their first round game to Detroit went on to cop the Consolation crown. They beat Milton decisively, and then earned the title by out shooting Guelph in overtime. They finished regular play tied 2-2.

It was Guelph who snuffed out Georgetown's hopes for at least consolation honours. The host team lost 4-1 to Oakville in round one, beat Acton 4-1. And then bowed to the Royal City by the same score.

This was the fourth year for the Georgetown Midget tournament which started in 1967 as a Centennial tourney.

Good attendance marked the 16 game schedule which started Thursday night but was officially opened Friday when Mayor Wheldon Emmerson dropped the puck at the start of the Georgetown-Oakville game. About 700 witnessed the Grand Championship.

The tournament was arranged by a committee of the Georgetown Minor Hockey Support Group under chairman Earl Neil.

# GRAPPLERS HERE SATURDAY Wrestling Rebs Triumph Win 2nd Championship

Georgetown wrestlers went into the lions den Saturday and came away with the meat.

Banting Memorial High School of Alliston, long a power in high school wrestling, had to settle for second place behind the Georgetown Rebels team, when they hosted 16 of the best high school wrestling teams in Ontario to their tournament.

Georgetown grapplers amassed 93 team points to Banting's 78, Sturgeon Falls' 66, and Winston Churchill's 55, as well as winning three individual weight class champions, one second, two third and two fourths. Eight of 13 Georgetown wrestlers placed in the top four in their class.

Winston Churchill school is last year's all-Ontario champion, Sturgeon Falls was runner-up in Ontario. Kirkland Lake was another school in the tourney known for its wrestling prowess.

It was Georgetown's second tournament championship of the season.

The Alliston tourney is usually an indication of competing schools' chances in the all-Ontario championships.

It was a goal by Brian Beaumont midway through the overtime period that gave Georgetown the victory, which made it a two game sweep.

### PICKED TOP CORNER

On the play, Glen Robinson carried the puck over the Preston blueline and dropped it for Beaumont who was trailing. Beaumont moved in quickly and picked the top left corner with a fast-rising shot which proved to be the winner.

Glen Robinson opened the scoring for the locals in the second period on a goal-mouth play set up by Alex Ovenden.

Preston pressure tied the game early in the third period, but Georgetown was quick to regain command. Seconds after the Preston goal, Bob Sargent rifled a shot from the point, which Charlie Fendley gobbled up and flipped into the side left open.

For a while it looked like Georgetown would seize the series in regulation time but Preston came through with their second goal in the late minutes to force an extra period.
