

6 Championships as GDHS Wrestlers Top Tourney

The post-Christmas Ontario High School wrestling season is highlighted by several large invitational tournaments throughout the province. The conveners of these tournaments attempt to attract the best competition around. The season climaxes with the all-Ontario tournament, a wrestling extravaganza which this year will feature over 600 of the finest young wrestlers in the province.

Georgetown District High School's wrestling team captured their third tournament title here Saturday adding momentum to their march toward the big prize. In their most decisive victory, the Rebs rolled up 127 points to win by a margin of 41 points over

Winston Churchill of Toronto, the runners-up.

Prior to Saturday's tourney, the Rebs won two of the largest and most competitive meets of the season, the Laurentian Invitational and the Banting Memorial Invitational.

Saturday, Georgetown hosted Banting Memorial, Newtonbrook, North York, R. H. King, Smiths Falls and Grey Highlands, with an open arm welcome which turned into a bear hug.

The visitors came with glowing credentials. Banting won the all-Ontario two years ago, North York were champions two years straight, R. H. King was third in the big Scarborough tourney last year, Smiths Falls

are defending EOSSAA champions, Grey Highlands is one of the strongest teams in CWOS-SSA this year.

Georgetown entered 13 wrestlers and all 13 placed fourth or better in their respective weight classes.

When the all day session was over the standing was as follows: Georgetown 127, Winston Churchill 86, Banting 83, Newtonbrook 67, Grey Highlands 54, Smiths Falls 24, and R. H. King 15.

The Rebel team had six personal championships, two seconds, three thirds and two fourths.

Georgetown high school will be the scene of the District

Championships tomorrow, and the CWOSSA championship, February 21. The all-Ontario finals are slated for Friday and Saturday, February 27 and 28.

Won First Game, Rebs Lose Out to J. F. Ross

John F. Ross, Senior Royals advanced into the District 10 basketball finals Thursday by virtue of a 66-42 victory over Georgetown Rebels.

Georgetown won the first game 53-44 and led by nine going into the second game. On the two point total series, Ross won by 15 points, with their 24 point margin.

The Rebels put up a good battle in the first half, with Fred Harris leading the offensive attack at guard, and Dave Clark providing an effective pivot. However, thanks to Jack Dolderman's defensive work from under the basket, most of Georgetown's potential scoring chances were unsuccessful.

The valiant Rebel team must be credited with some of the finest players in the league. Fred Harris constantly shows himself to be an outstanding playmaker as well as a fair point-getter. Dave Foster is the roughest player in the league,

which makes up for his lack of height compared to opposition forwards.

In fact, in last Thursday's game, he fouled out midway in the last quarter.

This was Georgetown's last game in District 10 basketball, and throughout the season they have been a never say die club well disciplined and well coached. Their lack of an outstanding scorer attests to the fact they excel in teamwork and sports acumen, when you consider that they defeated every team in the league once, with the exception of BM. They also gave BM one of their toughest games of the season.

The high scorers for Ross were Jack Dolderman (35 pts.) Bob Laughlin (7), Geoff O'Brien (5), and Jim Haalboom (5).

The top scorers for the Rebels were Fred Harris (9), Dave Foster (8), Hugh Williams (8) and Tom Brotherton (7).

RE-ELECT AUTHORITY CHAIRMAN

Reviews '69 Development In Halton Flood Control

1969 marked the end of a period of retrenchment and the start of a time of development for the Halton Region Conservation Authority, said re-elected chairman Barry Humphries in his annual report Thursday.

Humphries said the trend was evidenced by last year's completion of the Morrison Wedgewood Diversion Channel, the first of several major flood control works, and the beginning of construction of the Scotch Block Reservoir.

TREE NURSERY

In reviewing HRC's activities in the last year, Humphries noted:

- Kelso conservation area and the Glen Eden ski area usage surpassed the 1968 total of 125,000 visitors. Income was more than \$70,000. Numerous improvements were made for

swimming, hiking and picnicking.

- Nearly 140,000 trees were planted, half of them on private land, in reforestation programs. A new seed tree nursery was set up at Mountsberg where the authority also raised 3,500 pheasants and chukars.

REBUILT

- An old pond at the Esqueving Conservation area was rebuilt. The University of Toronto is conducting a study to find the best uses of the Crawford Lake property. Carlisle Community Pond was graded and dredged, but swimming had to be closed in August because of upstream pollution. The source of the pollution is still being sought by the Ontario Water Resources Commission.

- Weather stations were maintained at Kelso and Mountsberg.
