

# Juveniles Cop Championship Meet Orillia in Playdowns

Tri-County's double A Juveniles hockey championship was claimed by Georgetown in Bramalea's Victoria Park Arena, Sunday night.

An overflow crowd of close to 1,000 vocal fans looked on as Georgetown poured four goals into the Bramalea Hawks' nest to secure the 5-2 triumph and put their seal on the championship trophy in four games.

The locals rolled over Bramalea in three straight after absorbing their only loss of the season to date in the series opener.

## BEST CHANCES

Tri-County's best twine-minder, Bob Neil, took Bramalea's best chances away from them in the first period when the host club owned the territorial edge but came away trailing 1-0.

His mates took over in the second period building a 5-0 wall that was just too high for Hawks to scale. Bramalea dug down deep in their bag of tricks and found a goal in the third period, but if the never-say-die team wasn't aware of it their fans knew it was all over at the end of the second period.

Neil foiled Bob Howard on a first period breakaway and then took clear cut chances away from Dave Williams and Dave Craig in his campaign of frustration.

## STYMIED

And while one Neil stymied them at one end of the ice, it was a Neil combination that dented their armour at the other end. Jerry Neil's tip-in of a shot from the point by brother Bill on a power play made it 1-0.

Bramalea's best chance to tie went for nothing as Neil just got a piece of a shot by Sadler and the puck rattled off the cross bar.

Jerry Neil was awarded

his and Georgetown's second goal early in the middle period when the Hawks' goalie steered the puck into his own net in attempting to clear.

## IMPORTANT CALL

Doug Wiles refused to be drawn into a fighting major minutes later, and as a result Howard, who tossed all the punches, was nailed for five minutes in what may

have been the most important call of the contest.

He was serving his sentence as Georgetown inflated their lead to 5-0.

Benny Heppes hit for one and then Marty Fowler for two more with lightning quickness. Dwayne Hay had a hand in all three.

A deflection by Mike Sad-

ler and a shot from a bad angle by Dave Williams accounted for the losers' goals in the very late going.
