At their first board meeting Thursday night, the 1970 Directors of the Georgetown Y made a motion to look into the possibilities of acquiring more building space for the Y. The problems are, how much, what kind and can we 'ford it'?

Dave Soward and Archie Holroyd were appointed to study the building situation.

"Our first step," said Dave Soward, "is to project the Y's involvement to five years from now. We'll have to find out how much recreation will then be handled by Georgetown's new recreation committee. If the committee plan to provide yoga, judo, keep-fit, then the Y can devote more time to other aspects of family life. If we do that, then the Y will need... well, like a club-house... a place for members to drop in at any time."

**Hog Production, Steady Quality Above Average**

Halton was one of the few counties in Ontario in 1969 that did not have a considerable reduction in the number of hogs marketed. The 180 hog producers in the county marketed 29,304 hogs, just 5 below the previous year total.

Hog production in Ontario in 1969 was down 6.3% and in Canada down 8.1% from 1968. As a result the national average price was 34.67. The quality of the Halton hogs was above the provincial average with 63.3% having an index of 100 and over compared to the provincial average of 60.6%.
