

Suggest Sharing Could Save School Expenses

The new spending controls the Ontario government has imposed on school boards aren't likely to be felt by Halton County Board of Education.

Douglas Lawless, assistant director of education for the board, said that "as far as we can see our costs are well within the limitations."

However, Lawless pointed out that it was really too early to assess the effect the new controls would have on the board since the current operating budget has not been finalized yet.

Education minister William Davis announced Tuesday that

the province will assume 51 per cent of the total education cost in 1970.

The spending controls announced by Davis will involve the operational expenditures of school boards, which are based on per-pupil costs. The province will share in operational costs only up to a per-pupil expenditure ceiling of \$500 for elementary schools and \$1000 for secondary schools.

The comparative figures for the Halton board for 1969 were \$585 and \$1026.

CEILING UPPED However, Lawless pointed out

that the figures quoted by Davis excluded transportation and debt charges which involve another grant formula.

Applying this formula, the ceiling would be increased to \$650 for elementary schools and \$110 for secondary, he said. Based on the 1969 per pupil costs this would bring Halton within the limitations, he said.

FAIR SHARE

Lawless also pointed out that this would be dependent upon the Halton board "getting its fair share of the \$170,000,000 increase in grants."

Boards that exceed the per-pupil ceilings will have to pay the excess of their own revenues.

Ballet, Riding Classes New Additions to Local 'Y' Program

In April this year the Georgetown Y will be adding ballet, horse-back riding and slim and trim classes to their programs, which brings the total number of programs offered to 23.

This is fantastic when you consider that the Georgetown Y has no building and only a part time staff of two.

This is particularly fantastic when you consider that the Brampton Y has its own building, a full time staff of five, yet it offers only 16 programs.

THAT'S HOW

How does Georgetown do it? Volunteers — that's how! A great many people donate a great deal of their time so that youngsters of Georgetown can learn to ride and ski and be good baby sitters. They donate their time so that boys and girls can flip each other on the Judo mats instead of in the streets; so that young mothers with small children can get out of their homes (which often become prisons in the winter-time) to exercise and socialize; so that small toddlers can get in shape when it counts the most, when they are young.

These volunteers are assorted. There are housewives and career women, professionals, teenagers and businessmen, Olympic champions and people with two left feet.

NEW PROGRAMS

A small group of these volunteers met at Mrs. Margaret Gordon's house last Thursday to become the program committee. They confirmed the

new April programs mentioned above and also discussed the following:

1. Both winter ski programs were outstanding successes. Forty-two intermediates and experts joined the Saturday expedition to Twin Hearths, and 80 beginners spent their Sunday afternoons on local slopes with Y instructors. This makes a total of 122 Georgetowners who learned how to ski this winter, or improved their techniques, through the Y.
2. There will be an annual review again this April. This is an indoor display of all the physical activities carried out by the Y (except perhaps horse-back riding.)
3. The Y will be holding a morning program for youngsters during the spring holidays.

S.S. Supporters Not Taxed High Enough

Separate school supporters in Georgetown didn't pull their weight in 1968-69 according to Halton Separate School Board's finance committee chairman.


Following a board meeting Tuesday night, Feb. 17, M. P. Noonan said 1968-69 contributions from Georgetown covered debt service costs and left only \$10,000 for operation of the town's only separate school, Holy Cross.

NEEDS \$200,000

Noonan said the board needs about \$200,000 annually to operate the school which has an enrolment of 650 students.

He said Georgetown assessment has doubled to more than \$2,000,000 since the county system was organized, but only \$530,000 is expected to be produced in taxes for the new budget.

The subject arose during the regular board meeting.
