Board, Teachers Mum On Pay Negotiations

Halton Board of Education and the secondary school teachers' salary negotiating committees met Tuesday night, but both groups are still tight-lipped about the bargaining.

Paul Martindale, president of the Halton branch of the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation, said the board and teachers' committees are sticking to their agreement to conduct negotiations at the bargaining table and not in the newspapers.

He said another meeting has been planned, but no date was set.

The elementary school teachers' bargaining group met with the board's team Monday.

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LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

There were many interesting hands at the Acton Bridge Club last week. Unfortunately they were interesting but not instructive. Here is one of the more interesting hands. North dealt with North-South vulnerable.

heart. However, West led a heart in order to cut down potential ruffing in dummy. Declarer won in his hand and immediately led the ten of clubs.

This lead caused West to hesitate momentarily. Now you should never draw conclusions from your opponent's hesitation but at that time at the table, declarer knew that West did not hold both the ace and king of clubs. If West wins the club and does not lead a spade declarer is home free.

Let's say that West leads another heart. Declarer wins in dummy and takes a ruffing finesse in clubs. He can now draw trump and knock out the ace of diamonds. In all declarer makes five trump, three diamonds and one trick each in spades and clubs.

If West ducks the club lead and allows East to win, declarer should plan to sluff two spades on dummy's clubs. This, with a third spade being discarded on dummy's long diamond, will cut declarer's spade losers to none. If the opposition remains cooperative and does not lead a spade, declarer can get away with it.
