Last year, due to noticeable efficiency breakdowns in the workings of the Town of Georgetown, our council initiated and completed a study. Stevenson & Kellogg Lld. a' noted consulting firm, were hired to investigate all aspects of the town machinery, both physical and mental, and to submit a report with recommendations.

The report, costing \$4,000 was submitted in the late

fall. The major recommendation made was to hire a town administrator, manager or whatever name - the reason being that the town council apparently was (and still is?) not too efficient in handling normal workday problems, to complete programs, i.e. roads, depreciation funds, equipment, forecasts, proper planning, etc.

To rather drastically point out their inefficient workings, it is now approximately 4 months from the report submission and although they have agreed the town needs this position filled, they cannot agree as to how to hire a man or how much they should pay him. We wender now which program will be completed first, the 1969 road program or the hiring of an administrator?

To the Georgetown Council, we can only ask when you will get off your duffs and show you capabilities as responsible leaders. Perhaps you presently are!

To the Georgetown residents, remember this is election year. It is NOT TOO EARLY to review your present council. Come out and see them in action at the committee meetings every Thursday at 8 p.m. and regular council meetings every other Monday, with the next one being March 2nd.
