

Frank Dolson, 47, Prominent In Peel County Organization

A prominent Holstein breeder in Peel County, who had served in many important positions on county organizations, Frank Oliver Dolson, 47, died in Peel Memorial Hospital on February 18.

Ill since last fall, Mr. Dolson had planned a dispersal sale of his herd at Oakville on Feb. 19 and according to his wishes the sale proceeded that day. The herd was begun in 1900 by his father and had won many distinctions on the show circuit from 1920 until the present. Both Frank and his father made a wide circle of friends throughout North America among Holstein breeders who came to Peel County for help in selecting cattle for their herds.

CENTURY FARM

Mr. Dolson operated the family farm at Altona at 3rd Line West and 17 sideroad, Chinguacousy. It is a century farm, purchased in 1861 by William Dunn Dolson and farmed successively by his son Stephen, grandson Tom and great-grandson Frank.

Son of Thomas Dolson and the late Alma McClure, Mr. Dolson attended Altona public school and Brampton high school, then became a dairy farmer and cattle exporter. He had served as president of many organizations, including Peel Mutual Fire Insurance Co.

Near Ninetieth Birthday Mrs. Angus Lawson Dies

Living most of her ninety years on the 4th Line, Esquesing, one of the district's oldest residents died on February 25.

Mrs. Angus Lawson, the former Nellie Florence McDowell daughter of James and Fanny Russell McDowell, was born on April 16, 1880 and had lived to see the many wonderful changes of the twentieth century.

On Christmas day, 1901, she married Angus Lawson who predeceased her on October 24, 1959.

Like her husband she was a fond admirer of horses and it was a common sight in the early days to see her spirited white driver on the 4th Line.

Seek Councilwomen's Views on Legislation

The February meeting of the Local Council of Women was held in the committee room of Halton & Peel Trust Company building on February 20 with president Mrs. Anne Pritchard in the chair.

Mrs. R. H. Jones dealt with the correspondence including form letters from highway safety, TV and cable TV; pleas for public support for Nigeria from both UNICEF and the Red Cross; and a plea for a closer study of Indian affairs.

Mrs. Clayton Dick reviewed the current Consumer News featuring articles on the standardization of sizes of children's clothes; photography; an analysis of the content and value of mouth washes, vitamin tablets, the value of Vitamin A in Canadian diet and the value of the addition of Vitamin D to the daily milk supply.

The secretary was instructed to write the local MPP Jim Snow, urging him to support legislation to ban the use of disposable bottles.

The provincial council had asked for the findings of the Local Council on proposed legislation regarding (a) wide open Sunday; (b) lowering of school leaving age to 14; (c) legalization of the sale of marijuana.

A discussion was led by Mrs. J. Nieuwhof and as these matters were felt to be of vital importance to all citizens, a prompt reply was requested.

Husband Founded Georgetown's Largest Department Store

Widow of a man who founded one of Georgetown's largest retail businesses, Mrs. Hyman Silver died at her home, Glen Cedar Rd., Toronto on March 2. She was 84.

Mrs. Silver, the former Freda Rudger, came to Canada with her husband from their native Russia in 1921. They lived in Toronto until 1927, when they moved to Georgetown.

The present Silver's Department Store had its beginning two years later when Mr. Silver rented a small store in what is now Fong's Restaurant. Before that he had sold yard goods door to door in district communities.

Two years later he built the nucleus of the present store at the other end of Main Street, and with its several additions, it has become one of the largest clothing outlets in this district.

Mrs. Silver worked with her husband in the business in the early days, until he retired in 1942, when they moved to Toronto. Since then, their son Sid has operated the business. Their interest in the education denied to them was acknowledged when Mr. Silver established the Hyman Silver memorial awards in local elementary and high schools after his father's death in 1951.

Mrs. Silver leaves two sons, Sid and Nathan; 9 grandchildren and one great-grandson. Second youngest of a family of eleven, she also leaves one sister, Mrs. F. Rashman of Toronto.


