450 View Films, Hear Credit Union Explained

An estimated 450 persons attended the film evening presented by the Dutch Canadian Toronto Credit Union and the Holland Liberation Committee Georgetown in the Christian Reformed Church, RR 1, Georgetown on Friday.

After a short opening film, "Holland in the Off-Season" the Rev. Al Vandenberg, who is the vice president of the National Dutch Canadian Committee 1945-70, gave a short talk about "Operation: Thank you Canada."

OPERATION THANKS

"Thank you Canada" is an operation which is being planned and will be carried out by all the Dutch Canadians in May 1970 to commemorate the liberation of Holland 25 years ago and to show their appreciation and gratitude for the sacri-

fices the Canadian people made for this.

A national gift as a token of gratitude will be presented to the Canadian people at this 25th anniversary.

He outlined briefly some of the other activities which will take place at the same time. On Wednesday March 4, the National Committee will hold a press conference at which they will release to the public details of the "Operation: Thank you Canada."

IN THE MAIL BAG

Wants Council Act, Hire More Crossing Guards

Dear Sirs:
This is a copy of a letter sent to the Town of Georgetown. I would appreciate your printing it in your paper.

Re: Intersection of Park Avenue and Charles Street.

You will recall that the writer initially corresponded with you in September of 1969 with respect to the above intersection and subsequently again on the 17th of October, 1969 as a result of your non-response to the earlier correspondence and as a result of the death of a young child who was struck by an automobile at that exact intersection.

In the intervening four months children using that intersection and others on their way to Park School have been subjected to the same hazards that existed when this situation was first brought to your attention. Acknowledgment is taken of the fact that road markings and warning signs were placed at the intersections in question and also that a report and recommendations on traffic protection for school child-

ren was prepared and submitted to you by a committee composed of representatives of the Georgetown Police Department, the Halton County Board of Education and the Town Engineer.

That report made certain recommendations with respect to Park Public School among others and those recommendations with respect to Park School were in sum and substance the use of crossing guards at Charles and Park, Charles and Princess Anne Drive and Delex and Weber. The report is a reasonably comprehensive review of the various types of regulation that can be implemented with respect to school children but is weakened considerably by the statement that traffic volumes on the streets immediately surrounding Park Public School and some other locations are not sufficient to warrant the use of crossing guards.

This statement is apparently based upon a study of the traffic volumes in the County, most notably Oakville and Burlington. The point that seems to be missed, of course, is that

that kind of a comparison is misleading because children using streets are conditioned by the circumstances they find themselves in. If a child is forced to use a busy intersection in mid Metropolitan Toronto, he acquires a certain sense of traffic caution that a child who lives in a rural or semi-rural setting does not. The street still remains a hazard to him and if, as is demonstrated with respect to the above intersection, accidents can happen, then not to take quick action is purely and simply negligence.

Therefore, although one can take issue with the report that is presently before council, one can take even greater issue for council's apparent inability to act upon the recommendations made. Surely we don't have to suffer another tragedy before steps are taken to give the protection that is so badly needed.

It might too, as a matter of public obligation, be desirable to reply to letters that are written to you with respect to matters that appear to be of some concern to people and not to simply carry on your deliberations in secret and without public scrutiny in the hopes that the problem will simply go away. The problem will, of course, not go away each day that a child is missed, of course, is that

O.P.P. REPORT

During the 7 day period ending February 21st, officers of the Ontario Provincial Police

LIQUOR CHARGES

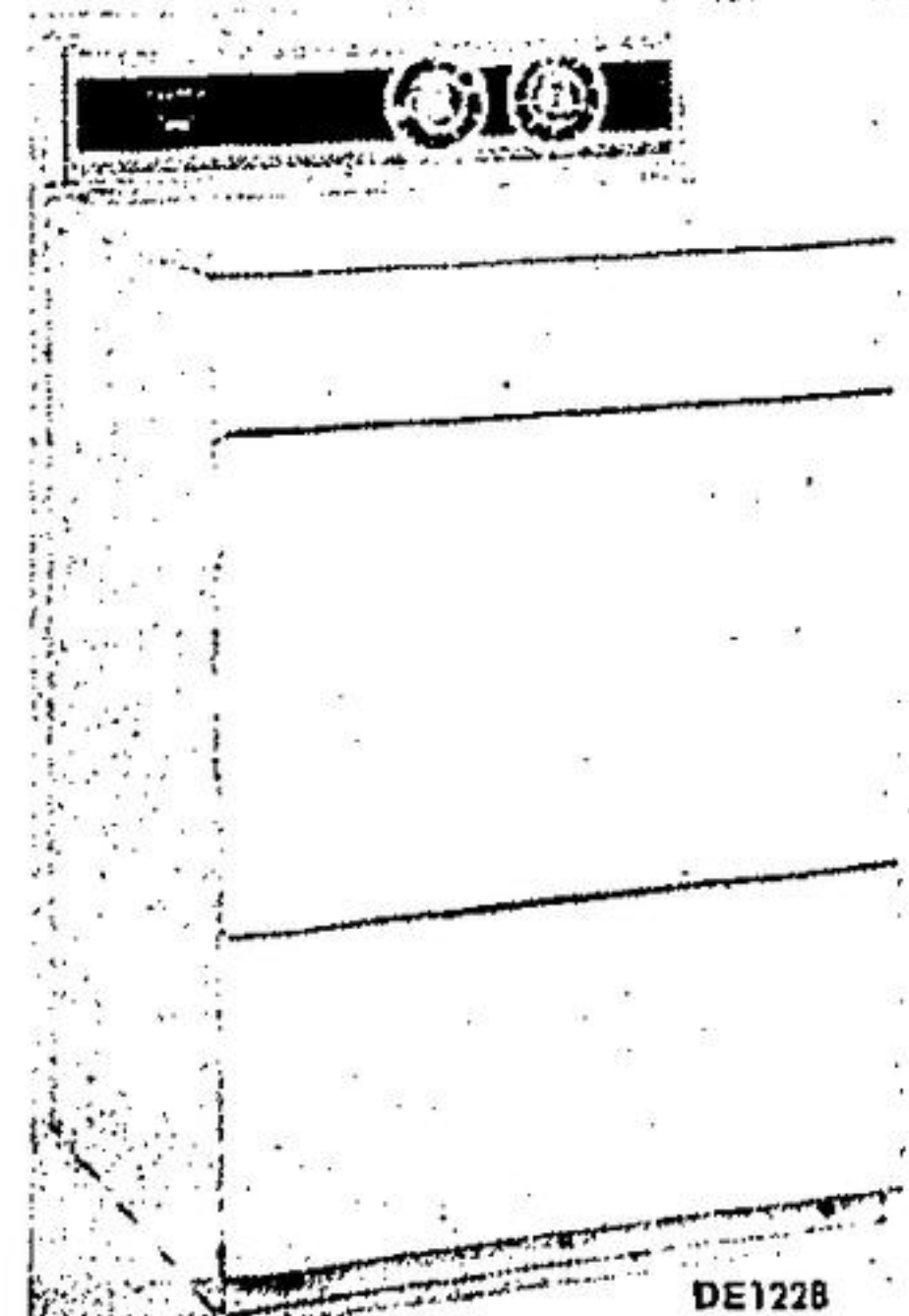
CARELESS

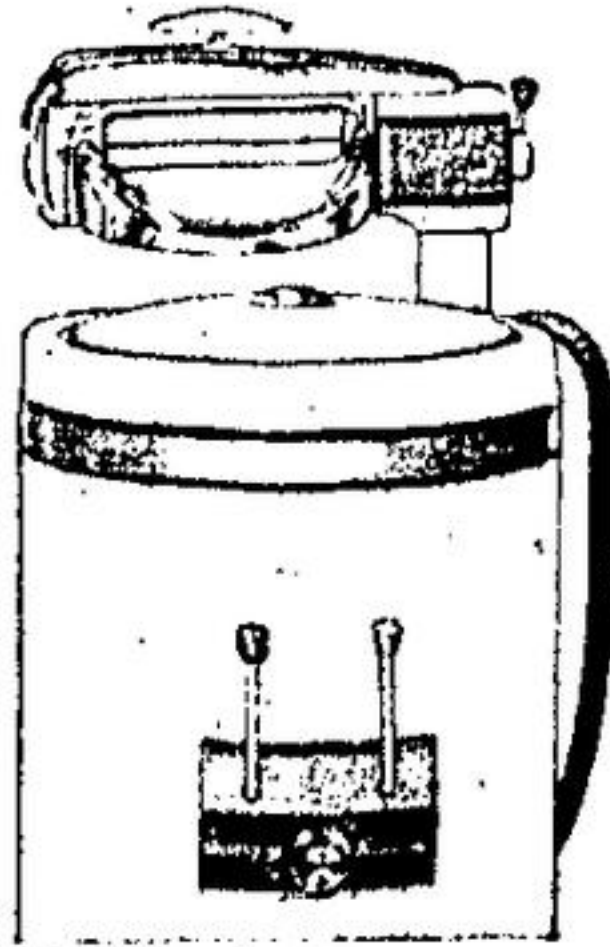

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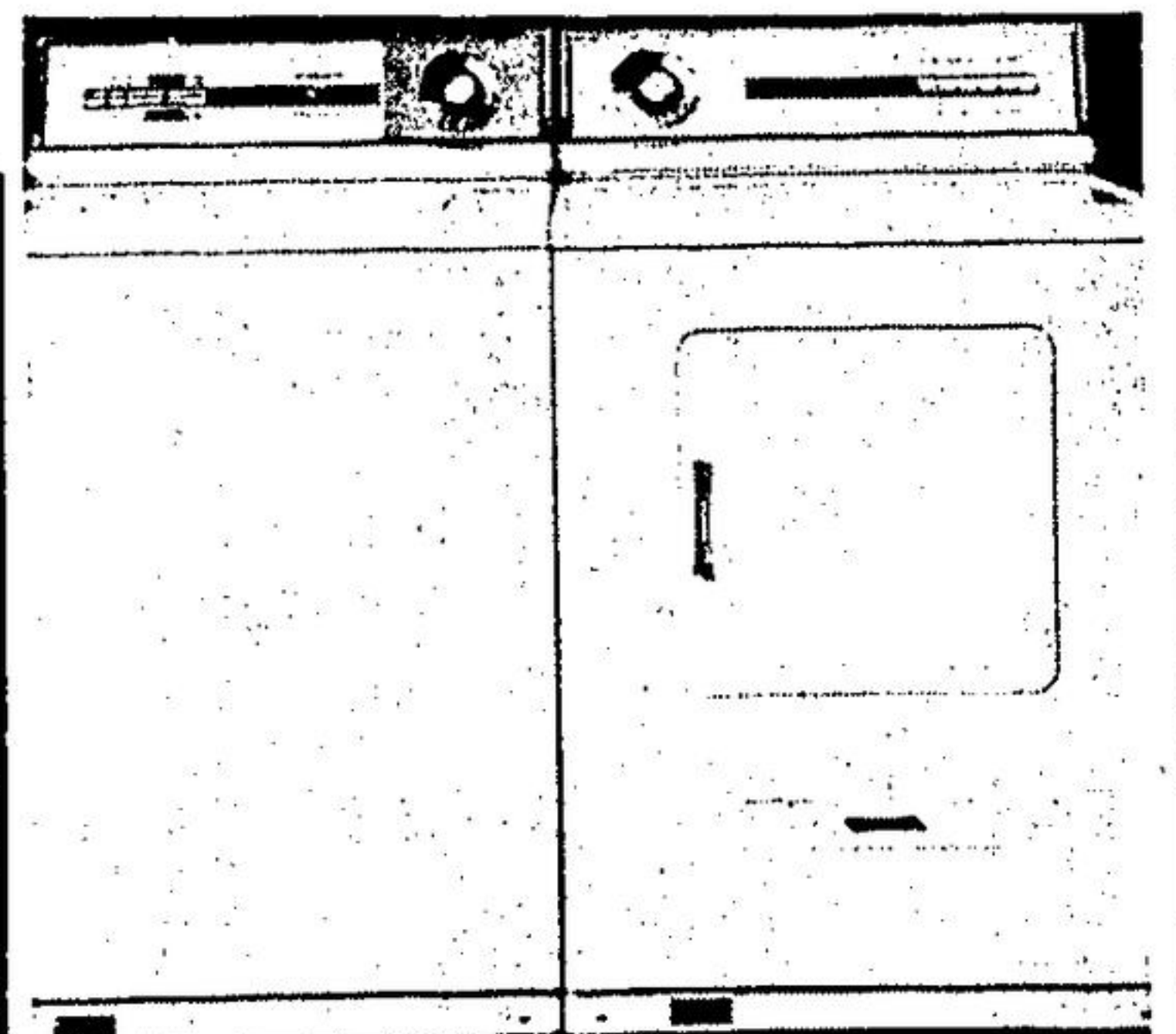
