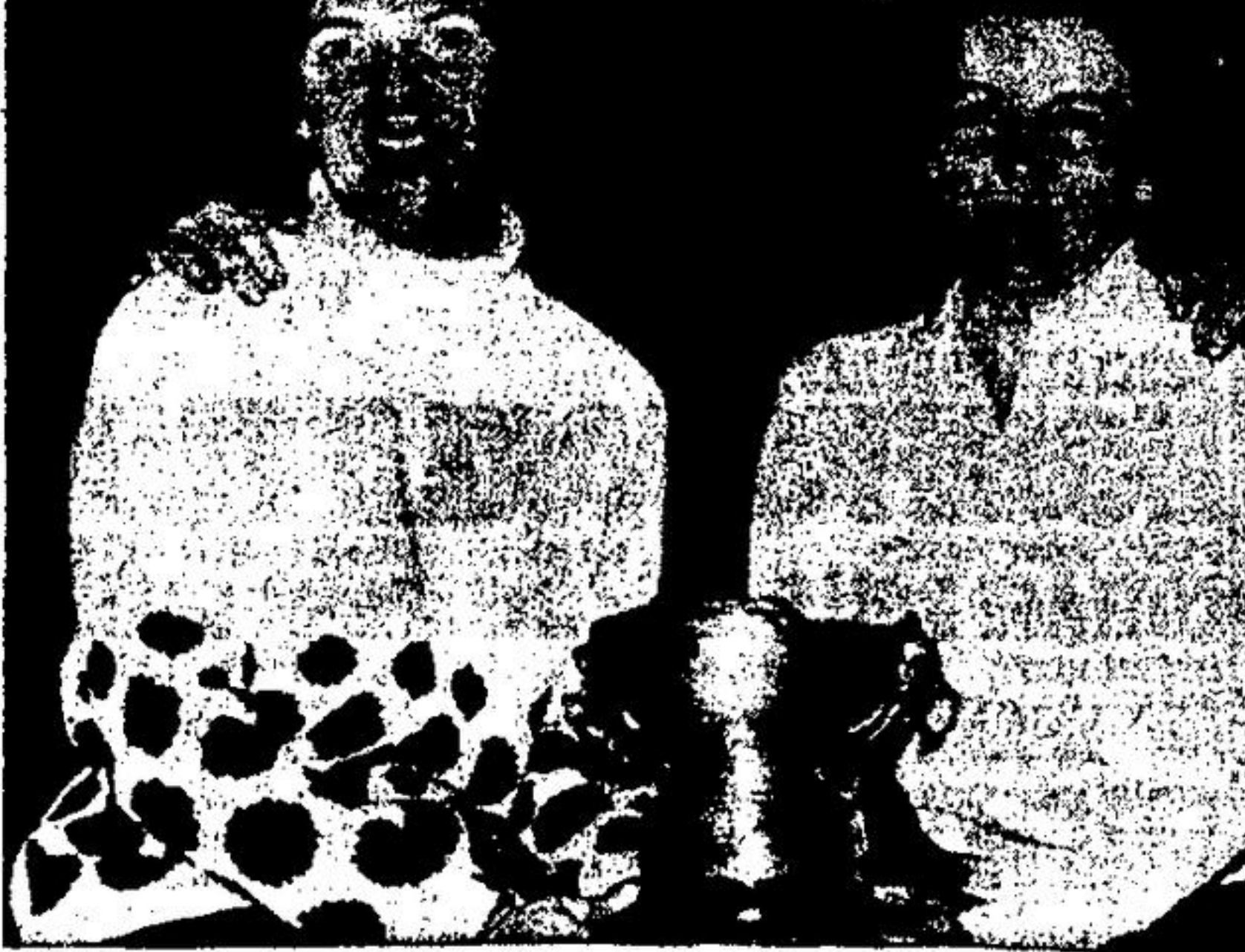
## Hull, Magnuson Rink Wins Langdon Trophy

### 10th Anniversary for Bantam Tournament

Bantam Hockey week is almost upon us again and the 1970 tournament will be the 10th time that Georgetown has opened the doors of welcome to the bantam hockey enthusiasts from all parts of Ontario and the States.

Whilst most Georgetown residents are familiar with this tournament, there are many of the newer residents who are not aware that, although the tournament is Kinsmen sponsored, it is in effect an affair which involves more townspeople than any other annual event in the community. From the time that the mayor declares the tournament open on the evening of March 20 until the final whistle and the declaration of the grand champions on Saturday, March 28, the population of Georgetown will temporarily increase by 800 young players and several hundred officials, parents and supporters.

Tournament play will commence every day, except Sunday, March 22, at 7:30 a.m. and it will take 79 games to decide the grand champions. The officiating of the games will be done by the Georgetown Referees Association assisted by referees from surrounding communities. Timekeepers, ticket booth attendants, statisticians, clerical and maintenance assistants will be provided by the Kinsmen, other enthusiasts, and students.

The Legion have made their kitchen and dining facilities available for our catering supervisor, Jessie Hayes who, with the assistance of church and other ladies' groups, will prepare two meals a day for the

tournament participants. Many residents' doors will be open at night to accommodate the players and, in general, our visitors will be treated like young ambassadors from their own town.

Many local merchants will be advertising in our Tournament Program and will help lighten the financial load. The town council will donate crests to each participant, and all trophies have been donated by individuals or community organizations.

The tournament is acknowledged as being the best of its kind in the country and it is no wonder that the list of towns who would like to be invited is almost as long as that we have been able to accept.

There is a certain air of excitement during Bantam Hockey Week and we certainly anticipate that this 10th Annual Tournament will be as successful as its predecessors, and the organizing committee look forward to seeing the townspeople give the tournament the support it deserves.

## Housing Shortage Solved For Part of Population

CANADAS - NORTHBOUND  
Last Wednesday despite the zero temperature, flocks of Canada Geese were seen flying northbound, probably to a rendezvous somewhere in Georgian Bay or the North Channel.

Our waterfowl have uncanny weather instincts. They must have known of the early winter last fall, which accounted for their early flight south.

### GIANT CANADAS LIKE "MAN-MADE" NEST

The first large scale program designed to re-establish breeding flocks of the giant species of Canada geese in Ontario is being conducted by the Lake Huron district fish and wildlife staff of the department of lands and forests in co-operation with the Niska Waterfowl Research Station at Guelph.

The Giant Canada Goose is a large, light-coloured bird that once nested throughout the southern Canadian prairies, the northern prairie states, and eastward through the lake states into southwestern Ontario. Although never abundant, they were well known to the old time western hunters — a race of huge geese compared to the more common Hudson's Bay, Atlantic and Lesser Canada geese that seldom exceed 10 lbs. in weight. These 'big honkers' frequently weighed in at 12 to 18 lbs. and they had a wing spread of six feet or more.

Unfortunately towards the end of the last century the giant Canadas gradually declined in numbers. In the early 1900s they were seen but rarely and were considered to be extinct between 1930 and 1932.

Rediscovery of the giant birds occurred in January of 1962 when Dr. Harold Hanson of the Illinois Natural History Survey was weighing specimens of Canada geese captured from a flock that were overwintering at Rochester, Minn.

The survey crew came up with what seemed to be impossible weights for these birds and believed their scales must be faulty. The scales were rechecked and the weights verified. Subsequent investigation conclusively proved that giant Canadas were not extinct.

Persons residing in the release area who are interested in participating as co-operatives in this re-establishment program are asked to contact extension biologist H. A. Orr, at the department's Hespeler office.

"Operation Giant Canadas" has been under way now for nearly a year and the big honkers have shown no objection to this new kind of housing ordinance instituted by the de-
