HELP ALL

Those attending the meeting heard an explanation of the new county social and family services set up, which has replaced the former welfare administration operated by each municipality.

Austen Ledwith, Milton and Fred Harrison, Georgetown, two of six field workers, explained that a main purpose is

to help those in trouble solve their problems rather than just handing out.

"We're getting away from the word welfare" said Mr. Harrison who was Georgetown's welfare administrator prior to his new appointment. "We are interested in helping anyone who needs a hand — widows, unwed mothers, incapacitated people, as well as those who are temporarily in trouble through unemployment."

EXAMPLE

Mr. Ledwith showed what help may be given a family using an example of a man and wife and three children. Assistance up to \$330 monthly is available plus free drugs if needed.
