### No Deputations, Council Has Quiet, Early Session

For the first time in many weeks no deputation appeared at Esquering council Monday night. "Amen," said reeve George Currie when he heard this, while the deputy reeve Tom Hill remarked "Thank goodness, no lawyers and no hecklers."

The brief meeting, lasting only till 8:25 p.m., heard correspondence from Halton Region Conservation Authority protesting any proposal to erect a superjet airport in the area. They expressed concern about pollution and decided to meet with the Credit Valley and Hamilton Conservation Authorities to discuss it.

#### OBJECTS TO COST

The building inspector's report showed a total of \$72,520 in permits issued during February, with all but \$8,000 for an addition at the Stanley Fishburn office, being residential.

## School Budget Awaits Salary Settlement for Finalization

Halton County Board of Education enters the last lap of its current operating budget talks this week.

At the meeting tonight the board will study instructional costs which account for 70 per cent of the budget.

The board will also deal with revenues for 1970.

The two items are the last to be considered before the board reviews the total budget presentation on March 19. Completion of the budget consideration is scheduled for March 26.

#### SALARIES

Committees representing Halton teachers and board members are meeting to discuss instructional salaries.

A settlement with the teachers must be made before the board can wrap up the current budget.

Estimates were presented Thursday night for educational services, attendance, health and food services, plant operation and plant maintenance.

Total figures for 1969-70 spending in these areas was about \$3,800,000 compared to estimated spending for 1970-71 of \$4,200,000.

#### REVIEWED

Items reviewed at the board meeting of February 12 included business administration transportation, tuition fees, capital expenditures, operating expenses, debt charges and non-operating expenses.

Budget estimates for 1970-71 considered so far total about \$10.5 million.

The figure excludes instructional costs which amounted to about \$22,000,000 for 1969-70.

The board's total budget for 1969-70 was approximately \$32,000,000.

### Approve One, Veto Other Maple Apartment Requests

Georgetown planning board has indicated approval for one projected apartment building on Maple Avenue East while rejecting another on the opposite side of the street.

The board made its recommendation dependent on changing the town's official plan to designate the area bounded by Maple, Mountainview and the CNR railway tracks as a high density area. M. Gitto is the applicant.

A proposed apartment by Alce Investments on the corner familiarly known as Hunter's Inn does not meet board approval. This is zoned industrial and the board will not approve spot zoning for this.

### Will Raze House In Bell Extension

The former home of Miss Beatrice Hume on Main Street North is slated to be razed.

Bell Canada is planning an addition to its adjoining building and informed the town council Monday that it will be tearing down the house which is on the site.

The Bell firm acquired the property some years ago, locating its building on the former Ruston property at the corner of James Street. The move became necessary when dial phones were installed in town, and the former switchboard system abandoned. Until then, the Bell office was further down Main, where Holmes 5c to \$1.00 Store is now located.

### Development Day School Holiday

Children of Georgetown and other North Halton public schools will have a holiday tomorrow.

Friday, March 6th has been designated 'Professional Development Day.' This is a day set aside each year to permit teachers to avail themselves of some experience or use to them and to their pupils.

Tomorrow the teachers will visit the Science Centre in Toronto.

### Authority Would Up Fee, Straight 5c, 10c

Georgetown Parking Authority has made six recommendations to council 'as a basis for discussion.'

1. The present by-law relating to parking in the downtown area be amended to exclude Sundays, Mondays and holidays.
2. Meters to remain as presently situated but fee for parking to be 5c and 10c, and to be for a period of one or two hours.
3. Parking Authority will take on the responsibility of collecting moneys from the meters and servicing them.
4. Issuing of tickets for parking violations should be considered as normal police department routine and no part of police officers salary should be charged to the Parking Authority.
5. Collections of all fines for violations will remain the responsibility of the police department and the revenue derived therefrom will be considered town funds.
6. Parking Authority to work with town works dept. in order that an annual budget be struck for repairs and upkeep of present parking lot.

### Wants Maple Numbers Uniform East, West

Splitting of Maple Avenue street numbering into east and west causes confusion, and could lead to delay in case of emergencies like fire and ambulance service, according to Mrs. Harry Shortill.

In a letter read to council Monday, Mrs. Shortill who lives at 45 Maple Ave. West asked consideration in numbering the street from one end to the other. She said she sometimes gets calls intended for the similarly numbered house on Maple East, and said a straight through numbering system would be an advantage to everyone.

### Site Purchase Near Second R.C. School

The Halton County Separate School Board is expected this week to approve purchase of a site for a second Roman Catholic elementary school in Georgetown.

Peter Watters board chairman, confirmed Monday that the board's offer to purchase the site has been accepted.

Watters said the school would be built in the eastern end of town. Catholic pupils in Georgetown are now served by the centrally situated Holy Cross School.

The new school will be the 21st in the system. The 20th St. Patrick's is now being built in Burlington.

The separate school board will hold its first budget meeting Saturday and deal with the school site purchase prior to the budget session.
