Clean Sweep for Georgetown in Four Town Hockey Tournament

Georgetown Saturday Morning House League all star teams turned in a 100 per cent effort to create a 100 per cent victory record at the Four Town Hockey Tournament here Saturday.

Georgetown Novice, Pee Wee, Bantam and Midget teams outshone their counterparts from Orangeville, Acton and Fergus in every game to make a clean sweep of the championships.

Last year, Georgetown's entries in the Four Town Tourney at Milton, brought home Novice and Midget crowns. Milton didn't take part in this year's tourney, but were replaced by Orangeville which hasn't vied for Four Town honours in ten years.

ORGANIZERS

A committee of Bud James, Bill Fisher, Bud Hill and Herb Robinson arranged the day. The schedule ran from 8 a.m. until 9 p.m. with lunch served in shifts from 11 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. at the Legion. Players, coaches, managers, referees and helpers were nourished there by a kitchen brigade made up mostly of Legion Ladies Auxiliary members headed by Mrs. Jessie Hayes. Volunteer teens helped set tables and served.

Jerry Perkins was referee-in-chief drawing most of his staff from Georgetown and Acton refereeing associations.

About 3,000 in all went through the turnstiles during the day with the largest crowds on hand, of course, for the division championships in the evening.

BANTAMS

Georgetown beat Acton 6-4 in the exciting Bantam championship game which concluded the schedule. Winners' goals were scored by David Holmes, Bill Kirby (2), Doug Pemberton, John Sargent, and Craig Fleming.

Earlier Georgetown Bantams had beaten Orangeville 8-2 on goals by Tony Pacheko (2), Arnold LeFebvre (2), Craig Fleming (2), John Sargent and Steve Grace.

Orangeville beat Fergus 11-0 to win the Bantam Consolation title. Fergus earlier lost to Acton 12-1.

PEE - WEES

Georgetown bombed Fergus 9-1 in the Pee Wee Championship match, with Mike Osborne (2), Jon Wright (2), Greg Bodnar, Grant Bodnar, Danny Field, Kim Gibson and Tom Norton the Georgetown marksmen.

Georgetown Pee Wees first win was a 6-1 triumph over Acton. Grant Bodnar scored a pair for Georgetown in this one with the rest from John Wright, Wayne Storring, Tim Norton and Brian Hallye.

NOVICES

Georgetown's narrowest margin of victory was in the Novice championship game with Orangeville which the locals won 4-3. David Paterson scored twice, and Mike Jobb and Scott Dwyer one each for the champs.

Their first win was against Acton, a 5-1 difference. Scoring for the winners here were Mike Jobb (2), Glen Bodnar, Richard Hewitt and David Paterson.

An 11-0 whitewash earned Acton the Novice Consolation championship over Fergus. Fergus failed to score in either of their two games, losing 10-0 to Orangeville in their opener.

MIDGETS

The Midget championship was decided in a one game showdown. Georgetown doubled the score on Orangeville 6-3 getting goals from Dave Lyons, Chris Broadbent, John Swann, Lorry Louth, Brian Brown, and Bill Dumper.

The Four Town tournament was organized to give the boys of the Novice, Pee-Wee, Bantam and Midget age brackets an opportunity to be involved in a tournament with out of town teams. In the Legion sponsored Saturday Morning Hockey set-up, the corresponding age groups are Junior A, American League, NHL and Senior League respectively.
