It was interesting to see some boys who played last season and could only be recognized facially. Some of them have grown at an alarming rate and are real young men now, especially in the PeeWee division.

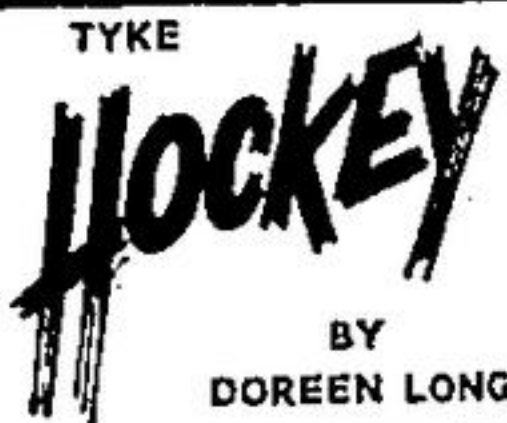
