

The Halton County Board of Education told Esquesing by letter, that their total costs for education this year will be \$751,806. \$450,033 will go to public schools, and \$300,873 to secondary schools

"This doesn't take into account that we had a surplus of \$40,000" said clerk Delmar French, "so the total cost is really \$791,806." He claimed this was an increase over last year of \$64,573.
