\$80 Water Bill Puzzler To Sargent Rd. Woman

A water bill for \$80 was the unpleasant shock received by Mrs. Marion Carlson, 54 Sargent Road, last month. She claims she is not in arrears, and has paid every hill on time. Until now her highest bill was \$14.50, which was a summer.

According to the bill she used 151,000 gallons of water from the time of the previous reading. The water charge was \$53.54 plus sewer service charge of \$26.77, bringing the total to \$80.31.

The meter was checked and found to be in working order, according to the water department. However, a new meter was installed. "They tell me I have to pay it" says Mrs. Carlson.

On being contacted by The Herald, Roy Ballentine, chairman of the Water Commission, stated, "It is the policy of the Water Commission that any water going through the meter, is the responsibility of the customer." He did however, say Mrs. Carlson was welcome to come to the next Water Commission meeting to discuss it further.
