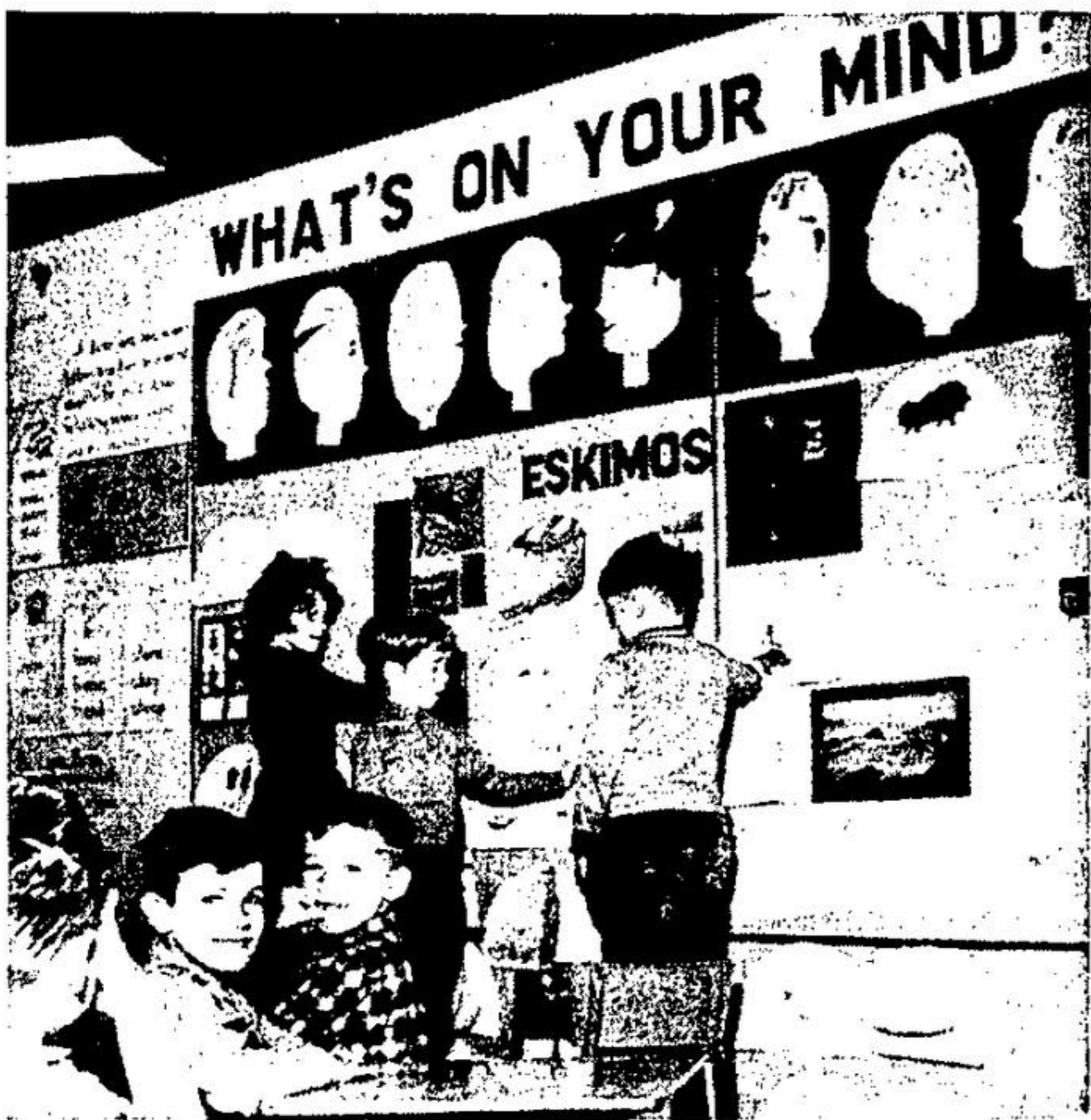

Few people sit down in the Manor games room. Those who do are usually waiting for someone to finish with a particular piece of equipment.

Mrs. Shauna Berube, in charge of entertainment at Halton Centennial Manor Home for the Aged says the games room is open continuously from morning until late evening.

Usually about two dozen Manor residents are occupying it in the afternoon and evening. Not the same two dozen, tho'.

"There are a few who show up practically every day, but mostly there's a steady come-and-go of people," Mrs. Berube noted.

Mrs. Berube joined the Manor staff in November, 1969. She is a qualified occupational therapy assistant.

Games room equipment includes a 10 foot square checkers board and a shuffleboard painted on the floor, a dart board, piano and the latest acquisition — a full size billiards table.

in the games room. There is a considerable amount of entertainment provided by visiting church groups dance clubs, and so forth, Mrs. Berube says

One resident who virtually supplies his own is Harold Getty, a Manor resident for five years.

The federal government will only approve payment for 11 members from each of the bands, while the Lorne Scots want to send 14 more. Their room and board is guaranteed in Scotland, but their fare, and lost pay is still needed.

DECISION
