

# Snow Writes Haskett Keep Commuter Train

Halton East MPP Jim Snow has written the Hon. Irwin Haskett, Minister of Transport, in an attempt to have the CNR continue its commuter train service through Georgetown.

The railway announced two weeks ago it plans to discontinue two passenger train services between here and Toronto. Because of their departure and arrival times the trains' passengers are in the main, commuters to the city.

Snow pointed out in the letter that dropping the two runs would leave the commuters with no reasonable alternate "until such time as an extension to GO transit is implemented in this area."

He told Georgetown Mayor Wheldon Emmerson in another letter that he intends to at-

tend hearings to be held by the Railway Transport Committee at Guelph "and will be pleased to add my support to your presentation at these meetings."

The trains which the CNR propose to drop leave Georgetown for Toronto at 7:02 a.m. and arrive here from the city at 5:25 p.m. The public hearing is scheduled for next Wednesday, April 8.

# Evacuation Plan As Nurses Threaten Mass Resignation

Milton District Hospital officials have made plans to evacuate patients if a mass resignation of nurses takes effect April 24th.

Although there has been no official confirmation of this report from hospital sources, it is believed that patients would be evacuated to nearby hospitals.

### REHIRED

Nurses at the hospital notified the hospital board last week that they would resign en masse if former director of nursing Mrs. Lucille Verrall is not reinstated in her position.

She was dismissed in January, but the hospital board rehired her two weeks ago. However, she was not reinstated to her position as director of nursing.

### REFUSAL

Board chairman J. M. Ledwith said last week he would not accept a mass resignation, only individual resignations. He said the hospital would accept with regret any individual resignations, and hire more staff.

However, the Registered Nurses Association of Ontario has officially grey-listed the hospital — in effect, urging nurses not to accept jobs at the hospital.

### WILL RECTIFY

Mrs. Isobel LeBourdais, public relations officer for the R.N.A.O., said she questions Ledwith's reluctance to accept a mass resignation, unless he doubts the validity of the signatures.

Mrs. Bruce Dolson said she feels the new administrator Ronald Woods will rectify the situation. "I don't know either nursing staff or board members very well but, I think a new administrator will get things straightened out."

### WANT REASON

She said Milton citizens are concerned about the disaj-

reement between the nursing staff and the board.

The 61 nurses have said they will resign April 24th if Mrs. Verrall is not reinstated as director of nursing, or if they are not given a 'justifiable reason' why she is not.
