## 'Exceptionally Gifted' Delights Capacity House

An organ recital by Dr. Melville Cook was received by a capacity audience in St. John's United Church Tuesday evening March 24.

"The most comprehensive and sophisticated electronic organ ever built in the history of the art was displayed with vitality and richness," St. John's organist Mrs. Kathleen Schuldt commented afterwards. She termed the visiting artist as "exceptionally gifted."

"The compositions by Handel, Bach, Wesley, Felton and Purcell were performed with dynamic sensitivity which enriched the musical experience of the audience," Mrs. Schuldt said.

She said Dr. Cook's "artistic interpretation of Nazard by the blind French organist Langis,

Processional by the Welsh composer Mathias, and the soothing tones of Evening Song by Bairrow, showed the brilliance and splendour of the organ"

The audience particularly enjoyed Scherzo by the Italian organist and composer Bossi.

Mrs. Schuldt described the moods of Suite Gothique by Boellman as "majestic and haunting" and "culminating in heroic dimensions."

Many of the audience enjoyed the fellowship of a reception which followed the recital at which time they were able to meet Dr. Cook personally. He will be leaving on April 12 for a concert tour of the British Isles and the Irish Republic.
