MAKING TRACKS
Tilsonburg was the location of the District 'B' convention which took place last weekend April 11 and 12.

We arrived in time for breakfast at the host Branch No. 153 after which we started out to walk two blocks to the Convention Hall. INVASION

Third vice president dominion command, Art Adams spoke to the convention on the government 'White Paper' and how it is causing great concern in all areas of the population of Canada. Mr. Adams is quite concerned, he feels the White Paper could be an invasion of all that Canadians hold and cherish as a free people.

The freedom that 105,000 Canadians died for and many thousands of veterans are still suffering for, is in jeopardy.

He assured the convention that the Royal Canadian Legion will use all powers at its disposal to urge the government to take a more rational look at the White Paper.

PREPARE POLICE MERGER
A plan has been drafted for the co-ordination of all police departments in Halton county in the event of regional government. The report is the result of a series of meetings of Halton police department officials.

The group was known officially as the Technical Co-ordination Committee of the County of Halton on Police Services for the Proposed Regional Government of Halton and Peel. However, Peel County departments never sent representation to the meetings.

The study will be continued by the Halton police departments, even to the extent of working out a protem budget.

Lauds Injunction Order For Proposed Dragstrip

Dear Sir:

At a time when topics such as pollution, destruction of nature areas, the growing pressure of ever-expanding population capture newspaper headlines almost daily, it gives great satisfaction to be able to report an event of great consequence in the fight to conserve a livable environment.

A few days ago a court order was issued in the form of an injunction against further work to create a dragstrip out of lot 27, on Esquesing Twp. This is a decisive step in the right direction and good news for the thousands of residents of this area who wish to see the North Halton region maintained as a viable community.

Not only will the immediate neighbours of the proposed dragstrip breathe easier, those people who, in good faith poured much effort and money into the construction of fine residences on the 5th and 6th Line, the injunction will also be welcome news to all those who have not yet given up all hope against pollution of the air, against intolerable traffic congestion, against deafening eng-

ine roar and all the other side effects which a venture such as a dragstrip would bring.

It can hardly be expected, though that the battle is already won. The organizers of the dragstrip will no doubt fight back and attempt to go through with their scheme despite the popular objection. Legal litigation may be long and costly and even though much money has already been contributed by dedicated people, more is needed. Mr. Ellis L. Taylor of 22 Rexway Dr., Georgetown, has taken on the task - at least for the time being - to act as treasurer and will co-ordinate all financial contribution to further this cause.
